Oct 2014 Update

All the theme parks in Orlando continue to add new excitement for their visitors – each and every park is a completely immersive and extraordinary experience that every visitor should try at least once. This year has been no exception in adding new thrills and here are just some of the more recent additions:

Walt Disney World Resort has completed a multiyear project that has doubled the size of Fantasyland with the opening of Seven Dwarfs Mine Train. This is a family-friendly coaster which takes guests on a wild journey through the mine "where a million diamonds shine."

Magic Kingdom Park also recently debuted an all-new daytime parade called the "Disney Festival of Fantasy Parade", featuring characters and music from memorable Disney films.

Universal Orlando Resort opened TRANSFORMERS: The Ride – 3D in summer 2013. The attraction combines larger-than-life TRANSFORMERS characters with life-like HD CGI media, state-of-the-art 3-D technology and amazing special effects to place riders right in the middle of an epic battle between the Autobots and the Decepticons. The world's first Simpsons themed area, Springfield, has also opened at Universal Studios Florida, with all-new attractions and restaurants, including Moe's Tavern where guests can order Duff Beer.

This year Universal Orlando Resort built on the enormous popularity of The Wizarding World of Harry Potter, by bringing to life experiences and places found in and around London in the Harry Potter books and films. Diagon Alley and 'London' is located within Universal Studios Florida, which is adjacent to Universal's Islands of Adventure, the current location for Hogwarts and Hogsmeade.

The Wizarding World of Harry Potter – Diagon Alley features shops, the Leaky Cauldron eatery and a new, multi-dimensional thrill ride, Harry



| | Potter and the Escape from Gringotts. Guests are able to travel between London's King's Cross Station and Hogsmeade Station aboard the Hogwarts Express. SeaWorld Orlando opened Antarctica: Empire of the Penguin - the biggest expansion in its company history - in May 2013. The realm includes a state-of-the-art ride that takes guests on an exciting journey through the dangers and wondrous beauty of the Antarctic as they follow and mimic a young penguin's adventures. Guests explore a penguin colony in an area that envelops them in cool extremes. In 2014 SeaWorld Orlando debuted an all-new Shamu show called Shamu's Celebration: Light Up the Night. And this year Aquatica – SeaWorld's Waterpark - opened Orlando's tallest and steepest free-fall waterslide. With slides nearly 80 feet tall (24 meters), Ihu's Breakway Falls is the only multi-drop tower slide of its kind in Orlando. Wet 'n Wild Orlando has also created a new, six story-tall waterslide this year. The Aqua Drag Racer propels guests through four lanes of head-to-head competition at fifteen feet per-second before splashing them across the finish line. |
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| Location | Within the last year LEGOLAND Florida Resort opened The World of Chima, an expansion based on the Cartoon Network animated TV series and LEGO product line. The World of Chima follows animal warriors on magical journeys and centers around an interactive water ride, Quest for Chi. And it also opened its newest expansion, DUPLO Valley in May, bringing the LEGO DUPLO line of preschool building toys to life with new farm-themed attractions, an air-conditioned indoor play area and a water play area all geared to toddlers ages 2 to 5. | Airport | For two consecutive years, Orlando International Airport was named by the International Air Transport Association survey as the number one airport in North America and number one in the world for overall passenger satisfaction for airports serving more than 30 million passengers annually. |
| Orlando leighbourhoods | Beyond the hustle & bustle of the theme parks, visitors looking to dig a little deeper will find an Orlando filled with quaint neighbourhoods brimming with culture, history and culinary gems. |
| | Downtown Orlando - With a mix of high rises and Victorian architecture, downtown anchors a "Cultural Corridor" that stretches for blocks with theatres, galleries, performing arts venues, and antique shops. The centrepiece is Lake Eola, a 43-acre park with generous sidewalks, lakeside cafes, wine bars, swan paddle boats for rent, and an intimate outdoor amphitheatre for concerts and special events. |
| | Winter Park - Just North of downtown, this European-style community dates back to the 1880's, when wealthy New Yorkers took the train as far south as it would go, and charms with tree-shaded avenues, cobblestone streets, and 10 blocks of cafes and boutiques (considered Central Florida's signature shopping street) anchored on one end by the Charles Hosmer Morse Museum of American Art and on the other end by the Rollins College Campus. |

| Trains | Amtrak serves Orlando with two daily trains originating from New York and Miami with stops in downtown Orlando, Winter Park, Sanford and Kissimmee, as well as with a tri-weekly train originating from Los Angeles. Amtrak also offers its popular Auto Train, which transports passengers and their vehicles and features the comfort of bi-level Superliner sleepers, a diner and a lounge. The Auto Train runs daily between Lorton, Va., and Sanford, leaving each town at 4 p.m. and arriving at the destination at 8:30 a.m. the next morning. |
| Car Rental | Car rental is easy at the airport and downtown locations with all major companies represented. Because of the competition for customers, the car rental rates are among the lowest in the world. Those who rent a car while in Orlando will find excellent signage that makes it easy to navigate throughout the area as well as friendly rental agents who will provide detailed maps that will guide you to your destination. Major highway networks provide easy access for visitors to reach their destination and for traveling in and around the Greater Orlando area. Major highways include Interstate 4, the Florida Turnpike, Highway 528 (Bee Line Expressway), Highway 408 (East-West Expressway) and Highway 417 (Central Florida Greenway). |
| Buses and More | Besides taxi and limousine service to anywhere in the Greater Orlando area, the city's Lynx bus system provides economical public transportation around Orlando. Bus stops are marked with a 'paw' print of a Lynx cat. The downtown Orlando Lymmo bus system provides free transit reaching from the T.D. Waterhouse Centre to City Hall. The 11 Lymmo stations are designated by kiosks and the eight Lymmo stops are indicated by a small sign. Returning to the horse-and-buggy days, |

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| Surprising | The world's most comprehensive collection of works by Louis Comfort Tiffany are on display year-round at The Charles Hosmer Morse Museum of American Art in Winter Park. |
| History | During the Second Seminole War , the U.S. Army established an outpost at Fort Gatlin, a few miles south of the modern downtown, in 1838. But it was quickly abandoned when the war came to an end. Prior to being known as its current name, Orlando was known as Jernigan, after the first permanent settler, cattleman Aaron Jernigan, who acquired land along Lake Holden by the terms of the Armed Occupation Act of 1842. But most pioneers did not arrive until after the Third Seminole War in the 1850s. Most of the early residents made their living by cattle ranching. Orlando remained a rural backwater during the American Civil War , and suffered greatly during the Federal Blockade. The Reconstruction Era brought a population explosion, which led to the city's incorporation in 1875. The period from 1875 to 1895 is remembered as Orlando's "Gilded Era," when it became the hub of Florida's citrus industry. But a great freeze in 1894-1895 forced many owners to give up their independent groves, thus consolidating holdings in the hands of a few "citrus barons" which shifted operations south, primarily around Lake Wales in Polk County. Perhaps the most critical event for Orlando's economy occurred in 1965 |



| | when Walt Disney announced plans to build Walt Disney World. Although Disney had considered the cities of Miami and Tampa for his park, one of the major reasons behind his decision not to locate in those cities was the threat of hurricanes. The famous vacation resort opened in October 1971, ushering in an explosive population and economic growth for the Orlando metropolitan area, which now encompasses Orange, Seminole, Osceola, and Lake counties. As a result, tourism became the centerpiece of the area's economy and Orlando is consistently ranked as one of the top vacation destinations in the world. |

Hotels and Resorts

The Alfond Inn, situated on the Rollins College property in the heart of Winter Park, opened in 2013 and features 112 guest rooms, upscale dining, on-site pool and fitness center, public space and 10,000 square feet (929 square meters) of flexible meeting space.

Universal's Cabana Bay Beach Resort welcomed its first guests on March 31, 2014. This brand-new value and moderately-priced property is the fourth on-site hotel at Universal Orlando Resort and evokes the classic, retro-feel of iconic beach resorts from the 1950s and 60's. The 1800-room hotel features 900 family suites and 900 standard guest rooms along with a 10-lane bowling alley, fitness center and two massive pool areas.

Aloft Orlando Downtown, a hip new Starwood Hotels & Resorts brand hotel, is steps away from City Hall, the Dr. Phillips Center for the Performing Arts and Amway Center.

Four Seasons Resort Orlando at Walt Disney World Resort is located just minutes from Magic Kingdom and Epcot. With 444 guest rooms (including 68 suites), a Tom Fazio-designed golf course, full-service spa, an elaborate pool area and a variety of dining options including a rooftop steakhouse, guests will be immersed in the luxury resort experience. The resort is now open.

Dining

California Grill, Disney's signature restaurant, underwent a massive



restoration and is now a fresh new American classic with a crisp midcentury Modern decor. Guests come for the panoramic view of the Magic Kingdom fireworks over Cinderella Castle and return for sushi, wood oven-roasted foods and creations like carrot-cilantro soup and scallops with gnocchi and smoked pork. The wine list is exceptional.

The COOP offers classic Southern foods with a dash of panache; this counter-service restaurant was created by John Rivers, owner of the homegrown 4 Rivers Smokehouse chain. Expect deviled eggs, buttermilk biscuits, po' boys and chicken and waffles, along with artisanal pies.

Eddie V's Prime Seafood, where fresh seafood takes on a contemporary twist, is a surf 'n' turf eatery located on Orlando's Restaurant Row. The dining room is polished, the patio has lake views and the busy lounge features live jazz seven nights a week.

Hamilton's Kitchen features locally sourced ingredients, which are transformed into traditional Southern dishes with a modern twist inside the boutique Alfond Inn hotel in Winter Park. Chef Christopher Windus has earned Best New Chef status in a local magazine for his inspired interpretations of American classics, especially a mac 'n' cheese with locally smoked ham.

Santiago's Bodega offers small plates from around the world, along with hand-crafted cocktails and an ultra-relaxed vibe. Such elements have made this newcomer to Lake Ivanhoe, the abundant arts and cultural area near downtown, a quick hit. It's modeled on a Key West predecessor.

Scratch, located in Winter Park, serves modern American tapas, emphasizing fresh, local and seasonal ingredients.

The Smiling Bison brings a casual and comfortable atmosphere to the area, while mantaining quality. With a craft-beer menu, this newcomer near the Milk District, just outside of downtown Orlando, is farm-focused. The menu changes regularly, offering seasonally inspired sausages, burgers, pizzas and "plates" like braised baby octopus or witbeer-glazed ham steak.

Txokos Basque Kitchen takes residence at the East Ends Market. With a James Beard award nominated chef, Henry Salgado, Txokos specializes in Basque region cuisine and centers around fish, cured meats, and a weekday Pintxos (tapas) Happy Hour.



Yard House features more than 100 beers, creative American fare, classic rock music and artwork by Jerome Gastaldi, setting a contemporary-California tone at the restaurant, now open on International Drive.

The Ritz-Carlton Grande Lakes Orlando opened a new restaurant, Highball & Harvest ("H&H") this September. The venue focuses on farm-to-fork dining and an authentic, local experience with the opening of this new casual dining concept, which features interactive dining, unexpected design, handcrafted cocktails and a creative, playful menu.

Transportation

Orlando International Airport (MCO) has approved plans to expand its passenger capacity. Originally designed to accommodate 24 million travelers annually, the airport plans to nearly double the capacity to 45 million travelers per year. Enhancements include maintenance of the existing facilities, expansion to achieve ultimate North Terminal capacity and improvement of international processing. Construction on the projects will begin in 2014 and conclude in 2017.

SunRail, a commuter train line stretching nearly 100 kms from DeBary in Volusia County to Sand Lake Road in Orange County, is now open to the public. Operating on existing railroad tracks, the service is scheduled to expand further north to DeLand and south to the Poinciana area, allowing travelers an alternative to gridlock, gas and parking expenses.

WHAT'S NEXT

Attractions

SKYPLEX will bring the world's tallest roller coaster to I-Drive of Orlando in 2016. The 570 foot tall structure will be the tallest in Central Florida, and feature the first Polercoaster, a vertical ride, dubbed the Skyscraper, weaving in and around the whole tower on coaster-length tracks. SKYPLEX will also offer views of the city via an observation deck, restaurant and lounge at the top, accessible by the region's tallest glass elevators.

I-Drive 360, a new entertainment complex located on International Drive, is scheduled to begin opening segments in spring 2014. The project is centered by a 425-foot (129.54-meter) observation wheel,



slated to open February 2015. Other entertainment offerings include Madame Tussaud's Wax Museum, Sea Life Aquarium and Skeletons: A Museum of Osteology. The project also includes a variety of dining and shopping such as Red Robin, Starbucks, Seafood Republic, Buffalo Wild Wings and Walgreens.

Walt Disney World Resort is currently developing the multi-year transformation of Downtown Disney into **Disney Springs**. Featuring an eclectic and contemporary mix from Disney and other noteworthy brands, this new expansion will double the number of shops, restaurants and other venues for guests to explore, to more than 150 establishments. The new area will open in phases with expected completion in 2016. Walt Disney World Resort has also announced details about the new Avatar-inspired land, set to open in 2017. The expansion, set to be the largest in Animal Kingdom's history, will feature floating mountains, bioluminescent rainforests and a Banshee flying attraction, as well as new after-dark entertainment.

Hotels and Resorts

Universal Orlando Resort and Loews Hotels & Resorts have announced plans to build the **Loews Sapphire Falls Resort**. It will be the fifth on-site hotel at Universal Orlando Resort, featuring 1,000 rooms and suites with a casual Caribbean theme, built around a lagoon and towering waterfall. The resort is expected to open in the summer of 2016.

LEGOLAND Florida Resort has announced plans of opening the **LEGOLAND Hotel** in 2015. The four-story hotel will feature 152 brightly colored and highly themed rooms and suites, LEGO décor, interactive play areas, a pool and a restaurant.

Walt Disney World's Polynesian Resort recently announced plans for renovations as the resort transforms into the **Polynesian Village Resort.** The improvements include new amenities for guests throughout the resort including a new pool, spa, lobby, child activity center, and the addition of a Trader Sam's Grog Grotto, based off the Trader Sam's Enchanted Tiki Bar at Disneyland. The renovations are expected to be complete by the end of 2015.

Grande Lakes Orlando will begin renovations this year, which will include updates to The Ritz-Carlton Spa and two new culinary offerings: Highball & Harvest at The Ritz-Carlton Orlando (now open) and Whisper Creek Kitchen, complete with an onsite brewery, at JW Marriott



Orlando (expected to open in fall 2014). A new look for The Ritz-Carlton Spa will be complete this summer and the indoor meeting space renovations are expected to be complete by the end of 2014.

Dining

Capa, a rooftop steakhouse named for a matador's red cape, sits at the top of the Four Seasons Resort Orlando at Walt Disney World Resort. The restaurant, now open, features both high-end service and views of the Magic Kingdom fireworks.

Mango's Tropical Café, a large restaurant and club accommodating up to 2,500 with an upbeat Latin American theme will open on International Drive in fall 2014. Vegas-style shows and Michael Jackson tributes will be as essential to the concept as lemonade mojitos and flavored daiquiris.

Pointe Orlando is in the process of adding new dining and nightlife venues this year, including Blue Martini (re-located from the Mall at Millenia), and the now-open RA Sushi and Minus5° Ice Bar.

Universal Orlando Resort will welcome eight new venues across **CityWalk** in 2014. New dining offerings include Hog Dog Hall of Fame, CowFish, Antojitos Authentic Mexican Food, Bread Box and Red Oven Pizza Bakery. The new options join guest favorites Emeril's Restaurant Orlando, Jimmy Buffet's Margaritaville, Hard Rock Cafe and Pat O'Brien's.

Downtown Venues

Dr. Phillips Center for the Performing Arts will be the new home for Broadway productions and Orlando Ballet among other performances. Located in the heart of downtown Orlando, the \$429 million arts center will include two performance theaters, a 300-seat community theater, outdoor plaza and banquet room.

Florida Citrus Bowl Stadium, home to the Capital One and Russell Athletic bowls, began renovations in January 2014. Renovations include replacement of the lower bowl, additional fan amenities and club space with an expected completion of January 2015.

Multipurpose Soccer Stadium will begin construction in spring 2014 with the anticipated opening of summer 2015. The stadium will be located in downtown Orlando in a developing entertainment center a



block away from The Amway Center. The stadium will seat 19,500 and serve as home to the Orlando City Lions soccer team.

Activities and Recreation

Daytona International Speedway's redevelopment project broke ground on July 5, with a targeted completion in January 2016. The project will feature new, larger seats, upgraded ticket gates and entrances, 40 escalators, 10 elevators and 11 football-field-sized, fan entertainment areas.

The Mall at Millenia has been ranked number ten among the world's top fifteen most successful shopping centers by Shopping Centers Today. The mall has also announced world-renowned luxury brands inculdung Prada YSL, and Swiss watchmakers Hublot, Omega, and Breitling are opening their first boutiques in Central Florida at Mall at Millenia.

Artegon Marketplace Orlando announced its opening in November 2014 on International Drive. The 1.1 million-square-foot shopping attraction will house Florida's largest daily indoor artisan marketplace with more than 160 studio spaces featuring unique art, one-of-a-kind boutiques, handcrafted items and diverse food offerings from some of Central Florida's finest craftspeople

Must Sees

International Heli-Tours opened on International Drive. The helicopter touring company offers aerial tours of Orlando, Kissimmee, Walt Disney World Resort, Universal Orlando Resort and more; showcasing the city's attractions, lakes and abundant wildlife. Specialty tours include celebrity house sightings, theme park sightings, resort sightings, fireworks viewing and alligator searches. Tours start at \$25. www.internationalhelitours.com; 407-239-8687

Several professional and semi-professional houses and many community theatres dot the area including Orlando-UCF Shakespeare Festival, Orlando Repertory Theatre, Mad Cow |

ATTRACTIONS

Blue Spring State Park, which is the winter home of large numbers of Florida manatees that come upstream from the St. Johns River to bask in the warm 22 °C waters of the springs. Canoeing, swimming and fishing are popular activities at Blue Springs.

Central Florida Zoological Park, located in Sanford on Lake Monroe. This 100 acre (400,000 m²) zoo is home to a butterfly garden, herpetarium, and numerous tropical animals. The zoo originally started as a collection in the Sanford Fire Department, but grew into a regional zoo in 1975. It is currently in the planning stages of expansion and renaming the facility to "Zoo Orlando at Sanford".

Church Street Station, a multi-level shopping mall and entertainment center that once featured an abundance of specialty shops, restaurants, nightclubs, and bars. Purchased in the late 1990s by TransContinental Talent owner Lou Pearlman, it is now virtually defunct, as the area suffered in post-9/11 tourist-industry slump. The area is being redeveloped with residential condominiums.

Cirque du Soleil: La Nouba, in Downtown Disney West Side, features its renowned blend of acrobatics and special effects with more than 70 artists from around the globe performing in a custom-designed, 1.671-seat theatre.

Cornell Fine Arts Museum, situated on the campus of Rollins College, features significant loans, recent acquisitions, and items from the Cornell's renowned permanent collection. Admission is free.

Gatorland houses thousands of alligators and crocodiles. A few of Gatorland's residents have made wrangling appearances in movies, television shows and commercial spots. The 54 year old park combines a petting zoo, bird sanctuary, mini-water park, eco-tour and outdoor entertainment, including daily alligator wrestling.

Hard Rock Café is the Orlando location of the famed restaurant chain with the typical HRC music memorabilia. There is also Hard Rock Live, a 3,000-capacity live music venue, and the Hard Rock Hotel, a resort hotel with a California-style restaurant called "The Kitchen". It is one of eight worldwide, and one of three in Florida. (Miami and Tampa are the other two.)

International Trolley and Train Museum features 14 model railroad trains with sound and lighting traveling through an indoor garden with 12 foot (4 m) high mountains, waterfalls, and more than 30 trestles and



tunnels. Also on display are toy trains from the 1920s to the present. Visitors can catch a ride in a California Victorian-style half open/half closed trolley or the 5/8 replica of an 1880 locomotive (a Mason Bogey) with its passenger cars.

Kennedy Space Center is 45 minutes from Orlando and south of Daytona Beach. Visitors can tour launch areas, see giant rockets, "train" in spaceflight simulators, and much more. Kennedy Space Center Visitor Complex is open every day except Christmas Day and certain launch days. Apart from the Astronaut Hall of Fame, Space Center bus tours run every 15 minutes with stops at an observation gantry and the Apollo / Saturn V Center. Other guided tours include NASA Up Close, Cape Canaveral: Then and Now, and Lunch With An Astronaut. Combo tickets offer maximum access admission, plus one guided tour.

The Kerouac House, in the College Park neighborhood or Orlando, is where writer Jack Kerouac lived during the time his novel On the Road was published and released, making him a national sensation and Beat Generation icon. He lived in the house with his mother Gabrielle from July 1957 to the spring of 1958, and wrote his three-act play, The Beat Generation, a 51-chorus poem called Orlanda Blues, and the novel The Dharma Bums during his time there. In 1997, the Kerouac Project of Orlando formed, and restored the Kerouac house. It is now a haven for aspiring writers who can live in the house as they create their own work.

The Morse Museum of American Art, located at Rollins College, houses a permanent Tiffany & Co. exhibit featuring the world's "most comprehensive" collection of the works of Louis Comfort Tiffany. It includes Tiffany art glass, jewelry, pottery, and the chapel interior designed for the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago. There is also an exhibit on the Tiffany home, and American paintings from the 19th century. The museum was founded in 1942.

Old Town, in Kissimmee, features eight restaurants, fifteen amusement park rides and 75 shops along its brick-lined streets. Classic car shows every Friday and Saturday feature hundreds of vintage automobiles. Admission and parking are free.

The Orange County Regional History Center Features exhibits and artifacts from the earliest days of the region to the modern day. Includes information on everything from the time of the Seminole Indians to the founding of the city to the Civil Rights era to the Disney period to today.



The Orlando Museum of Art, which has ongoing exhibitions of American portraits and landscapes, American impressionist works, and art of the ancient Americas. The Orlando Science Center, is a 19,000 m² hands-on learning center with hundreds of interactive exhibits for visitors of all ages. Images surround visitors on the giant screen of the Dr. Phillips CineDome. Other attractions include the Body Zone, teaching health and fitness, as well as an observatory. The center has the largest refracting telescope in Florida. The Ripley's Believe It or Not! Orlando Odditorium is located in a building artfully constructed to appear as if it were collapsing to one side, which may be a sly reference to central Florida's infamous sinkholes. Visitors can explore bizarre artifacts, strange collections, weird art/hobbies and interactive exhibits in sixteen odd galleries. It is one of 27 Ripley museums in ten countries. Wonder Works A funhouse located on International Drive. Can be easily identified as an upside down white building. Wekiwa Springs State Park, which comprises around 7,000 acres (28.3 km²) of wild Florida. The springs pump out 42 million gallons of crystal clear water a day. Popular activities at the park include canoeing, swimming, picnicking and fishing. World of Orchids, featuring thousands of blooms in an enclosed tropical rainforest. World of Orchids is a working greenhouse shipping orchids and other plants nationwide. A greenhouse covers nearly 4,000 m², and in this controlled climate of warm, humid air some 1,000 orchids are displayed in a natural jungle setting, with streams, waterfalls, and squawking parrots. World of Orchids also has a 300 m long boardwalk meandering off into nearby wetlands. Admission is free. Wet n' Wild A large waterpark located just minutes from Universal Studios on International Drive **Beaches** St Petersburg/Clearwater on the Gulf Coast is known as Orlando's Beach and is a two hour drive away. Here you will find some of the finest beaches anywhere in the US and they have been consistently rated as the best in the US. **Pools** In addition to four of the world's top water parks, Orlando guests enjoy some of the most unique and elaborate resort pools. Families will have a blast at the Nickelodeon Suites Resort, which features a zero-depth entry heated pool anchored by a four-storey
