COLORADO

Colorado offers both adventure and well-deserved relaxation. Enjoy urban sophistication in Denver or venture outdoors in the Rocky Mountains. Taste the excitement of some of the world's most sought-after whitewater rafting. Discover the history of mining and historical railways. Or, with an average of three hundred sunny days a year, pamper yourself at one of Colorado's award-winning resorts.

There are impressive urban destinations in the state too: **Denver and Colorado Springs** in particular are great short break destinations and you will find separate sections for these two cities further down in these notes.

Colorado is known for its fabulous skiing at world class resorts such as Aspen and Vail. But it provides great sporting activities all year round including hiking, biking, rock climbing, rafting, zip lining and more! And there is golf, horseback riding – even Segway tours through amazing canyons. When you arrive in Colorado and you look at the western horizon, all you see are awe-inspiring mountains...and adventure beckons with both hands!

The outdoor playground that is Colorado also offers no less than four National Parks:

Rocky Mountain National Park: with high-mountain lakes and streams, peaks more than 14,000 feet, thick evergreen forests and thousands of acres of wildlife, this park conjures up what most people imagine when they think of the Rockies. Trail Ridge Road at 12,183 feet is the highest continuous paved road in the United States.

Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park: no other canyon in North America combines the narrow opening, sheer walls, and startling depths offered by the Black Canyon of the Gunnison.

Mesa Verde National Park: this is the site of the prehistoric Ancestral Puebloan culture, which lasted for some nine hundred years from c 450 to 1300 on a plateau in south-west Colorado at an altitude of more than 2600 meters.

Great Sand Dunes National Park: nowhere else in the United States do mountains of sand stand higher than here in the Rocky Mountains. The tallest dune towers 750 feet high at an elevation of 8,700 feet above sea level.

You will also discover a rich western heritage in Colorado with nine



historical trains and gold mine routes that introduce you to the Gold Rush days. The 19th-century mining boom drew many people to Colorado with the hope of striking it rich. Today, travellers can experience a mining train trip 3,000 feet into the Bachelor Syracuse Mine in southwest Colorado and see the prosperous, historic main streets of mining towns such as Breckenridge, Leadville and Central City. And one of the best ways to immerse yourself in the wild west is to stay at a Dude Ranch and discover the cowboy lifestyle.

Colorado's history is full of rich American Indian heritage that can be experienced at galleries and festivals across the state, in addition to history museums and sites such as the Ute Indian Museum, Koshare Indian Museum and along the Trail of the Ancients Scenic and Historic Byway. A beautiful new attraction for history lovers is the History Colorado Center in downtown Denver, with three stories of exhibitions packed with gold mining, Wild West, Spanish American War, Ancestral Puebloan, 10th Mountain Division and other Colorado museum treasures.

And one thing that the visitor will certainly enjoy in Colorado is amazing food, wine and craft beer. There are more than 2,000 restaurants in the Denver Metro area alone, serving local dishes such as buffalo burgers and rattlesnake tails. And more than 80 different beers are brewed in Denver alone!

Plus there are four different wine trails in the state, which include dozens of wineries and vineyards.

The Front Range Wine Trail features two dozen wineries and tasting rooms in amazing areas including the Royal Gorge in Cañon City and Rocky Mountain National Park in Estes Park, and the quaint Victorian town of Georgetown.

The Heart of Colorado Wine Country Trail takes visitors around two federally designated AVAs in Colorado's Wine Country: Palisade and Grand Junction.

The Four Corners Region Wine Trail takes visitors from Durango to Cortez, near the iconic Mesa Verde National Park.

The Pikes Peak and The Arkansas Valley Wine Trail, which leads visitors over Wolf Creek Pass through the picturesque San Luis Valley, passes through the Central Colorado towns of Salida and Cañon City. A popular way to experience some of these trails is via bicycle,

GETTING AROUND	
Getting There	Denver International Airport is the only major airport to be built in the



U.S. in the last 25 years. The current facility can accommodate 50 million passengers a year without any additional construction. It is the USA's sixth-busiest airport and the 11th-busiest in the world. The airport is easily accessed by interstate highways and is conveniently located less than 35 minutes from downtown Denver by car, shuttle buses, public transportation or taxis. I personally rate it as one of the most traveller-friendly airports in North America. Air Canada have daily flights with the only non-stop service - and the only Executive Class - between Montreal and Denver.

Cities

Denver

Population: 557,000. Elevation: 5280 feet (one mile high!) Denver is near the mountains, not in them. It is located on high rolling plains, 12 miles east of what locals call the "foothills," a series of gentle mountains that climb to 11,000 feet. Just beyond is the "Front Range of the Rocky Mountains," a series of formidable snowcapped peaks that rise to 14,000 feet. Denver might not be in the mountains, but the mountains dominate Denver. There are 200 named peaks visible from the city, including 32 that soar to 13,000 feet and above.

Denver really is exactly one mile high. By an amazing stroke of good luck, there is a step on the State Capitol Building that is exactly 5,280 feet above sea level – one mile high.

Denver is one of America's most beautiful and most fun cities. And it's a lively city with a great love of the outdoors. Down every Denver street there are mountain panoramas. Discover sports stadiums, three hundred restaurants, bars and brewpubs, a restored historic district, museums, galleries, shopping, performing arts and more. Plus it's a great gateway to all that Colorado has to offer.

In hopes of gaining political favours, local boosters in 1859 named the frontier mining camp on the South Platte River "Denver" after Kansas Territorial Governor James Denver. They never received any favours -- by the time they named the town, Denver had already resigned. It was years before James Denver saw the mining camp named after him. He was reportedly not impressed.

In 1858, there was not a single person living in the Denver metro area except for some migrating camps of Arapaho and Cheyenne. Just 30 years later, Colorado was a state with a population of almost 200,000. It was a Gold Rush that caused this boom, and in a 30 to 40 year period Denver saw some of the wildest events in the "Wild West". This fascinating period lives again in museums, old gold mining villages and hundreds of elegant Victorian buildings that can be found throughout the city, many of which now house restaurants, shops and hotels. Denver is one of the few cities in history that was not on a road, railroad, lake, navigable river or body of water when it was founded. Denver just happened to be where the first few flakes of gold were found in



1858 and it was here that the first camp was made. The first permanent structure was a saloon.

Cities: Colorado Springs

Colorado Springs

Colorado Springs is the state's second-largest city, but it's first in the hearts of many visitors as a place of spectacular beauty with dozens of family attractions, natural landmarks and unique museums. Although many towns and cities in Colorado were settled by miners and ranchers, Colorado Springs' appeal was climate and culture. Known as "Little London" in its early days, the city was founded by Gen. William J. Palmer in 1871. A Civil War hero and railroad magnate, Palmer influenced much of the state's settlement, but Colorado Springs was his home. It had plenty of "civilized" attractions — opera houses, fine hotels and restaurants.

The only mountain zoo in the US is in Colorado Springs. This seems fitting somehow in this mountain paradise. Craft beer is big here and there are also distilleries and even the chance to try moonshine... There are pure mineral springs at Colorado Springs – and these have also attracted visitors for well over 100 years. There are also 3 new spas in the area - including a solar powered building that heats the Manitou Mineral Springs

The city sits at the foot of one of America's most famous landmarks, Pikes Peak, upon whose summit Katharine Lee Bates was inspired to write "America the Beautiful." You can reach Pikes Peak — America's Mountain — by road, you can ride the spectacular Pikes Peak Cog Railway - or even hike to its 14,115-foot summit. And Colorado Springs offers many opportunities to enjoy breathtaking natural scenery trails, parks and open space. The stunning red rock formations of The Garden of the Gods Park draw tourists with cameras in tow to capture a perfect shot of the rocks framing the snow-capped peak. There are many ways to explore this unique place — walking or hiking, on horseback, or on a thrilling jeep or Segway tour.

Colorado Springs' incredible climate means there are more than 300 days of endless blue skies in which to enjoy over 55 attractions and activities. Popular stops include the U.S. Olympic Training Center, North Cheyenne Canon Park and the U.S. Air Force Academy - check out www.visitcos.com for all that there is to see and do. www.experiencecoloradosprings.com

Garden of the Gods: The Garden is a unique biological melting pot where the grasslands of the Great Plains meet the pinon-juniper woodlands characteristic of the American Southwest, and merge with the mountain forest of the 14,110-foot Pikes Peak. See the Visitor & Nature Center and see the amazing HD movie "How Did Those Reds

The U.S. Olympic Complex in Colorado Springs is the headquarters for the U.S. Olympic Committee administration and the Olympic Training Center programs. A visit here is a fascinating insight into the drive behind all Olympic competitors and one of the city's names is "Olympic City USA". There are plans for an Olympic Hall of Fame.

Cities: Grand Junction

The largest city on Colorado's Western Slope and the heart of Colorado wine country, Grand Junction sprawls across the Grand Valley, perfectly situated for exploring the wonders of northwestern Colorado — and wonders certainly abound. Grand Junction presents a dramatically different side of Colorado - where mountain biking leads from a desert trail into any of the 22 wineries. Where you can wine and dine next to the majestic Colorado River, and can explore the Grand Mesa National Forest or the desert landscape of the Colorado National Monument. Grand Junction is filled with unique adventures, such as riding horses to seek out the wild horse bands of the Little Book Cliff Range. Like rafting the whitewater of the Colorado River — or floating gently through town and then making a stop at the brewery when you're done. What about going on a dinosaur dig with a paleontologist? Or hiking to see dinosaur bones right from the trail!

Grand Junction is renowned as Colorado's Wine Country and there are 22 wineries are open year-round. Harvest is typically in September, and so is Colorado's largest wine festival – Colorado Mountain Winefest, held the 3rd weekend of every September. That pairs perfectly with the agri-tourism scene, for which Grand Junction is the hub in Colorado. Lavender farms and peach orchards dot the landscape in perfectly planted rows. For a fun, carefree day, rent a cruiser or electric bike and tour winery to farm stand to winery to orchard. And as well as biking you can tour wine country by limo, motorized scooter, motorcycle or



horse-drawn carriage!

Grand Junction, Colorado is the beginning of the Canyonlands of the West and Colorado National Monument preserves one of the grand landscapes of the American West. Sheer-walled canyons, towering monoliths, colorful formations, desert bighorn sheep, soaring eagles, and a spectacular road reflect the environment and history of the plateau and canyon country. The 37 kilometer long Rim Rock Drive is the primary access to this 20,000 acre park from which visitors can experience all the park has to offer. Touted by Outside Magazine and USA Today as one of the top 10 best places for solitude in the US, the Monument features 11 canyons, 20,000 acres of arched windows, rock spires and natural monoliths - all thrown by the hands of wind and rain over millions of years.

Cities: Fort Collins

Fort Collins

Situated north of Denver and tucked between the plains and the mountains, Fort Collins is the last city on Interstate 25 north before you hit the Wyoming border. It's also a gateway city to northern Colorado's Rocky Mountain National Park and Roosevelt National Forest. And it has plenty to offer on its own, including a well-deserved reputation as one of Colorado's top craft-brewery hubs.

Though there was a fort here in the 1860s, it was more of a trading post where American Indians and traders met on the banks of the Cache la Poudre River (French for "hide the powder"), for the most part in friendly fashion. While its name suggests otherwise, there's never really been a strong military presence here.

Nowadays, Fort Collins is home to Colorado State University, and it has all the liveliness and bustle of a college town. Good restaurants, brewpubs, nightlife and culture abound. There's always something going on!

70% of Colorado's craft beer comes from Fort Collins - there are 16 breweries to visit including the well-known New Belgium Brewing Company. The Fort Collins community is very supportive of its brewing companies – a neat idea is "Branch Out Cider" which collects apples from the "community orchard" (basically apple trees whose owners cannot use the crop) and it then goes on to make ciders and apple wines. Fort Collins also has a growing craft coffee movement. Fort Collins is one of only 4 Platinum Level Bike Friendly communities in the U.S - making it a fantastic destination for experienced cyclists and families alike. The Fort Collins Bike Library allows you to rent a bike free of charge for a day and explore the 280+ bike lanes and trails in and

kinds. The Cache La Poudre River, Colorado's only National Wild and Scenic River, is great for rafting, kayaking, fly fishing and more. While Soapstone Prairie Natural Area represents a pristine, natural environment for the native species to roam as they did hundreds of years ago. There are even plans for Bison to be reintroduced to the area in the near future.

Cities: Durango

Gold brought many of the first settlers to Durango in the Animas River Valley, located in the southwest corner of Colorado's Rocky Mountains. Durango was founded in 1880 by the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, when they extended their line from the town to Silverton in order to haul precious metals from high-country mines. Trains were essential transportation of the day, bringing supplies in and gold ore out. Today, when the Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad blows its whistle, tourists climb aboard for a 72 kms trip through the still-wild San Juan Mountains to Silverton, where they can lunch and shop before re-boarding for the trip home. Scenic train rides depart 3 times a day from Durango to Silverton and back. Other Special train ride events include the Wine and Rails, the Durango Brew Train and the Blues Train.

Suffice it to say, if it can be done outdoors, then it can be done in Durango. There is a huge mountain biking community and there is top-notch whitewater rafting on the nearby Piedras, Animas and Dolores rivers. If you like fishing, bring your pole. Backpacking and camping are prime activities - or you can rent a cabin and spend lazy days on a high mountain lake.

Here are just a few of the exciting adventures awaiting you in the area: The San Juan Mountains provide the breathtaking backdrop for Durango's outdoor playground. Experience fun family-friendly outdoor activities like the Alpine Slide, Diggler Mountain Scooters, a zipline, family ropes course, scenic chairlift, mountain bike trails, and more at Purgatory Resort.

Enjoy a high elevation festival like Music in the Mountains, Muck & Mire, a family-friendly mud adventure race, and more.

Feast on local fare and inspired cuisine at Durango's 100+ restaurants. After a fine meal, stroll the streets, take an art walk or enjoy live music at various indoor and outdoor venues.

Pull on the boots and shine up the buckles for the True West Rodeos; there are live Gunfights at Diamond Belle Saloon and the Durango Cowboy Gathering in September.

Visit the Saturday Farmer's Market, take a tour of James Ranch and dine at the Harvest Grill & Greens, or perch on the lawn for live music and local wine at Fox Fire Farms.

Float or fly-fish the Animas River. Take the whole family to the outdoor

	Leadville, Colorado and Southern Railroad: Nestled in the alpine valley under the shadow of Colorado's highest peak, Leadville was settled and developed by miners and merchants in the 1800s. 	Cripple Creek and Victor Narrow Gauge Railroad: Enjoy a four-mile round-trip through historic Victor and past old mining sites, then back to the gold-rush town of Cripple Creek, now known for its low-stakes gambling as well as its restored Victorian-era town.
	Cumbres & Tolec Scenic Railroad: The longest and highest narrow-gauge line in North America, it stretches 103 kilometers from Antonito, Colorado to Chama, New Mexico. From an open-air sightseeing coach, you can take in the sights and enjoy on-train refreshments.
	Georgetown Loop Historic Mining and Railroad Park: You can hop on at either the Georgetown or Silver Plume Depot; this historic narrow-gauge railroad loops through both as it makes its way through Clear Creek Canyon. Originally built in 1884, the railroad is a major attraction in Georgetown, and it's easy to see why as you gaze out from open-air or covered cars at the rugged wilderness going by.



	Manitou and Pikes Peak Cog Railway: The world's highest cog (rack) railroad, this line takes passengers to the 14,110-foot/4,300-meter summit of Pikes Peak, and its one-of-a-kind views.
	Rio Grande Scenic Railroad: Colorado's newest scenic train offers steam engine rides out of Alamosa. Enjoy hundreds of miles of historic rail, through mountain valleys and passes.
	Royal Gorge Scenic Railway: The little train with big views of the spectacular Royal Gorge. An incline railway with open-air cars allow for breathtaking vistas of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains and Royal Gorge region on this three-mile, 30-minute round-trip ride.
	Royal Gorge Route Railroad: This 1950s-era rail line forges through one of America's most spectacular canyons. Travel in comfortable cars (including three recently added historic observation dome cars) as you chug along the bottom of the gorge and look up 1,200 feet/366 meters to the Royal Gorge Bridge spanning the top.
Car Rental	There's no better way to see Colorado, than from the open road. Whether you're looking for a car, truck, 4x4 or ATV, there are plenty of companies around the state that provide rental vehicles of all shapes and sizes.
Buses	There is excellent bus service both within Denver and throughout the state. Tour bus charters to many of the sights are also available.
Passes	Mile High Culture Pass, Denver With the Culture Pass in hand, you'll receive admission to some of Denver's most fascinating attractions, all for the bargain, "Mile High" price of \$52.80 (a savings of more than \$25) or three attractions of your choice for \$25 (a savings of \$12). You can receive the Culture Pass via your mobile phone or in a printable format. Over the course of five consecutive days, the \$52.80 pass will admit visitors to all seven participating attractions. Or the \$25 pass will admit visitors to three participating attractions of their choice over the course of three consecutive days. The pass is activated at the first attraction visited. Far View Lodge, Mesa Verde

The Denver South Park and Pacific came to Gunnison via the Alpine Tunnel a year latter on September 1, 1882. The Museum's narrow gauge train consists of the D&RG Engine #268, a flanger, a gondola, a boxcar, a livestock car and a caboose.

The Denver Zoo, located in City Park, spans more than 75 acres and is home to nearly 4,000 animals including rare Amur leopards, okapi, black rhinoceros, elephants, vampire bats, orangutan, Komodo dragons and more. The 113-year-old Denver Zoo is consistently among the most popular paid attractions in the Denver metropolitan area and among the top 10 zoos in the country.

National Parks

Mesa Verde National Park: The Mesa Verde landscape in the American southwest is considered to be the type site of the prehistoric Ancestral Puebloan culture, which lasted for some nine hundred years from c 450 to 1300, on this plateau in south-west Colorado at an altitude of more than 2600 meters (8,500 feet).

There is a great concentration of spectacular Pueblo Indian dwellings. Some 600 'cliff dwellings' have been recorded within Mesa Verde National Park, including the famous multi-storey ones such as Cliff Palace, Balcony House, and Square Tower House, built of sandstone and mud mortar, and an additional 4100 archaeological sites have been discovered. New discoveries are routinely made.

The exceptional archaeological sites of the Mesa Verde landscape provide eloquent testimony to the ancient cultural traditions of Native American tribes. They represent a graphic link between the past and present ways of life of the Puebloan Peoples of the American south-west.

In 1978, Mesa Verde National Park was named a World Heritage Site in recognition of its exceptional archaeological relevance – including its spectacular cliff dwellings tucked into the sandstone alcoves of its steep-walled canyons.

These fascinating cliff dwellings were built by the Ancestral Puebloans (previously known as the Anasazi) in the late 12th and 13th centuries. Guided tours are available for park visitors. Additionally, many prehistoric villages and archaeological sites found on mesa tops, provide a link to North America's prehistoric past.

Great Sand Dunes NP: Nowhere else in the United States do mountains of sand stand higher than here in the Rocky Mountains. The tallest dune towers 750 feet high at an elevation of 8,700 feet above sea level. The entire dune field itself encompasses 30-square miles within the 150,000-acre park. Aside from the dunes, this national park provides ample camping and hiking opportunities. Four-wheel driving is also available along the challenging Medano Pass — an off-road route



that stretches roughly 40kms from within park to the town of Gardner. Explore the tallest dunes in North America. Whether hiking, sliding, or exploring in a dunes wheelchair, the Great Sand Dunes are a unique wilderness area protected for all to enjoy.

Rocky Mountain National Park: This park encompasses the pure and natural beauty of the region. With high-mountain lakes and streams, peaks more than 14,000 feet, thick evergreen forests and thousands of acres of wildlife, this park conjures up what most people imagine when they think of the Rockies. Open from Memorial Day to late autumn, Trail Ridge Road — topping out at 12,183 feet — is the highest continuous paved road in the United States. And it one of the most breath-taking rod trips I have ever experienced.

Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park: No other canyon in North America combines the narrow opening, sheer walls, and startling depths offered by the Black Canyon of the Gunnison. There are hiking and ranger-guided programs. The Black Canyon of the Gunnison's unique and spectacular landscape was formed slowly by the action of water and rock scouring down through hard Proterozoic crystalline rock. The South Rim Drive is 12kms from Tomichi Point to High Point, and has 12 overlooks. Most are reached by walking a short trail. Allow 2-3 hours to view several overlooks. Those with limited time should consider stopping at Gunnison Point, Chasm View, Painted Wall and Sunset View. The South Rim Visitor Center, which features exhibits on the canyon, is located at Gunnison Point and has exhibits, introductory film, publications and Junior Ranger program for kids. http://www.nps.gov/blca/index.htm

National Monuments

If you want to create lifelong memories, look no further than Colorado's eight National Monuments. Whether you're interested in fossils, geology, ancient peoples or the lore of the gold rush, the National Parks Service and Bureau of Land Management in Colorado have set aside areas of national interest you simply can't miss.

Browns Canyon National Monument

One of the nation's most popular locations for whitewater rafting, Browns Canyon was just named a national monument in 2015. This Arkansas River-carved beauty also hosts fishers, wildlife watchers, hikers and more throughout the year.

Don't Miss: The canyon is a great place to see bighorn sheep (Colorado's state mammal), elk, deer, eagles, falcons and many other wildlife species.

Around the Monument: Part of the Arkansas Headwaters Recreation



Area, the region around Browns Canyon offers up spectacular opportunities for camping, mountain biking, cross-country skiing, hiking, OHV riding, rockclimbing and many more activities. The Collegiate Peaks Scenic & Historic Byway is a great way to explore the area, including many scenic vistas amid the state's densest concentration of fourteeners.

Colorado National Monument

Picturesque Colorado lives here. Don't blink, because with colorfully striated cliff walls, rock arches, high mesas and ample wildlife, there's a magnificent sight everywhere you look in the Colorado National Monument.

Don't Miss: The geology of the site appeals to rock hounds and landscape lovers alike. View the varied formations by taking the winding 23-mile Rim Rock Drive along the plateau, where wind and water-sculpted sandstone greet you around every turn.

Around the Monument: The Colorado National Monument is a gateway to the Dinosaur Diamond Scenic and Historic Byway. Prehistoric rock art is found along this route, as are many dinosaur excavation sites where museum-quality bones have been extracted.

Canyons of the Ancients National Monument

Culturally rich Canyons of the Ancients National Monument holds the distinction of having the highest density of archaeological sites in the country. Come for the Ancestral Puebloan history and stay for the unspoiled land of Colorado's high desert. It's not everywhere that culture, history and pure nature can mingle so well. This monument is perfect if you want to get away from it all and be enveloped in the quiet of the outdoors.

Don't Miss: The Lowry Pueblo is the only developed recreation site within the monument. With interpretive signs and brochures on-site, you can take a self-guided tour of a historic Ancestral Puebloan structure. Around the Monument: Drive the areas that Ancestral Puebloans once explored on foot, on the Trail of the Ancients National Scenic Byway that circles Canyons of the Ancients National Monument. Make sure to visit the Anasazi Heritage Center, a nearby stop that will help shed light on the history and legend of the people who once settled the area. Full of informative displays and cultural facts, a visit here gives people a greater respect for those who came centuries before.

Chimney Rock National Monument

Chimney Rock National Monument, once home to the ancestors of the modern Pueblo Indians, is of great spiritual significance. More than 200 homes and ceremonial structures built by the Chaco people 1,000 years



ago near the twin rock structures that give the monument its name. From mid-May through September, guide walking tours are available of the 4,100-acre archaeological site. Starting at the visitor center, you'll head to Great House Trail to learn about the site, its excavation and the people who settled there so long ago.

Don't Miss: This one's easy to miss. Every 18.6 years, a lunar standstill takes place at Chimney Rock. During the winter solstice, the moon rises perfectly between the rocks, framing an amazing scene that can only be seen from the Great House Pueblo. Researchers suggest the pueblo's builders constructed it where they did for this reason. The next predicted alignment is in 2022.

Around the Monument: Chimney Rock is located west of Pagosa Springs in the San Juan National Forest. Navajo State Park, with its beautiful boating and fishing waters is located just 40 minutes south of the archaeological area.

Florissant Fossil Beds National Monument

Tourists have been visiting the fossil beds here since the 1870s. Groves of petrified redwood forests and thousands of fossilized insects populate this national monument. Although the Florissant Fossil Beds are lush and green today, roughly 35 million years ago, volcanic eruptions covered this area in ash and lava, encasing plants and animals in preserving stone. Up to 1,500 different kinds of fossil insects have been found here, making it one of the most diverse insect fossil sites in the world.

Don't Miss: Easy hikes to petrified forests are great for the whole family. Take the Walk Through Time (1/2 mile) and Petrified Forest (1 mile) trails to see some of the largest petrified sequoias in the world. Around the Monument: The Gold Belt Tour Scenic and Historic Byway begins near the park. Take this 135-mile route through areas that were once integral to Colorado's gold rush. To the east, just outside of Colorado Springs, is the Garden of the Gods, where paved hiking paths weave through a giant natural rock garden.

Dinosaur National Monument

Images of dinosaurs feed the imaginations of children of all ages, and Dinosaur National Monument is where our dreams of unearthing these goliaths become real. The Green River also flows through this area, and wildlife abounds along its banks. You can even drop a line in and tease a trout out of the river with a perfectly placed cast. An inspiring look at the monument can be found on a drive along Harper's Corner Road, a scenic tour that leads travelers to a grand overlook above the confluence of the Green and Yampa rivers.

Don't Miss: While the fossils themselves are the big draw, don't let the



name of the park dissuade you from other "must do" activities in the area. In fact, a novel way to see the monument is aboard a raft. Companies take visitors through the park's two river systems, the Yampa and the Green. Watch for wildlife along the banks and marvel at the canyon walls as you float down the oxbowed rivers. Around the Monument: To the south of the monument is the Dinosaur Diamond Scenic and Historic Byway. This scenic highway showcases Fremont Indian rock art and is spotted with dinosaur dig sites.

Hovenweep National Monument

Remote and often uncrowded, Hovenweep National Monument includes a bevy of structures, namely a series of stone towers built by the Ancestral Puebloan people. The site is famous for its square, oval, circular and "D"-shaped towers. Square Tower site is easily accessible, with a nice hiking trail and visitor center.

Don't Miss: Head out to one of the remote outlying sites, including Cajon, Cutthroat Castle, Goodman Point, Holly and Horseshoe/Hackberry. Each is reached by a half-mile or less hike and offers quiet reflection at the structures built so many years ago. Around the Monument: For a completely different experience, take a tour of the Ute Tribal Park. Full-day tours of this primitive area are led by Ute Indian guides who share their knowledge of both Ancestral Puebloan and Ute cultures, sites and rock art.

Yucca House National Monument

Yucca House is another Ancestral Puebloan valley pueblo near Towaoc, but it has not yet been excavated and there are no facilities. Hopefully in years to come, it will yield many exciting discoveries.

Gardens

Denver has 200 parks with lakes, flower gardens and mountain views – the largest city park system in the nation.

Garden of the Gods:

The Garden of the Gods is a public park located in Colorado Springs. It contains red sandstone hogback formations, similar to the Red Rocks



	south of Denver. The name Colorado is said to come from the color of
	this sandstone. The hogbacks are ridges of sandstone, whose layers
	are tilted. Instead of lying horizontally, some layers are even vertically
	oriented. Each hogback can range up to several hundred feet long,
	some as tall as 50 feet from ground level. Their shapes indeed
	resemble the backs and spines of a pig. Entrance to the park is free,
	according to the wish of Charles Elliott Perkins, whose children donated
	the land to the city of Colorado Springs in 1909. It contains numerous
	trails for hiking, walking, mountain biking and horseback riding. Many of
	the most popular trails are paved, in an effort to combat the rampant
	erosion of the park's land caused by its numerous visitors.
Historical Sites	Fort Garland Museum:
	Visit this restored frontier adobe fort, built in 1858 to create a military
	presence in the San Luis Valley. The fort was once commanded by the
	legendary frontiersman Kit Carson. Buffalo Soldiers who helped protect
	the valley were stationed at the fort.

	The 16th Street Mall in Denver is a mile-long pedestrian promenade through the heart of downtown Denver, lined with shops, department stores and outdoor cafes. Free buses leave either end as often as every 90 seconds, making this the best spot for "people watching" in the city. In summer, the Mall is decorated with 25,000 flowers.
	Tattered Cover, 1628 16th Street, Denver is one of the nation's largest independent bookstores and housed in a restored mercantile building.

Colorado has **four distinct wine trails**, which include dozens of wineries and vineyards. A popular way to experience some of these trails is via bicycle, particularly in Colorado Wine Country.

- The Front Range Wine Trail features two dozen wineries and tasting rooms in amazing areas including the Royal Gorge in Cañon City and Rocky Mountain National Park in Estes Park, and the quaint Victorian town of Georgetown.
- The Heart of Colorado Wine Country Trail takes visitors around two federally designated AVAs in Colorado's Wine Country: Palisade and Grand Junction. Visit wineries in towns such as Delta and Olathe, known for its amazing sweet corn, and along Surface Creek, which offers incomparable views of the largest flat top mountain in the world: The Grand Mesa.
- The Four Corners Region Wine Trail takes visitors from Durango to Cortez, near the iconic Mesa Verde National Park. Workers in Vineyards in this culturally significant area have been known to find ancient pottery shards and arrowheads among the rich soil.
- There's also the **Pikes Peak and The Arkansas Valley Wine Trail**, which leads visitors over Wolf Creek Pass through the picturesque San



Luis Valley, passes through the Central Colorado towns of Salida and Cañon City, before winding up at Pikes Peak and historic Manitou Springs.

Colorado **craft distilleries** have grown from just four in 2007 to more than 50 in 2015. And the state's rapidly growing artisan craft spirits industry produces everything from artisan whiskey and organic gin and vodka to brandies, liquors, and other spirits.

- The master distiller at the brand new Breckenridge Distillery is Jordan Via, American Distilling Institute instructor and, comes from a California winemaking background. Today he uses his talents to turn out bourbon whiskey, single malt whiskey (ready in three more years) and classic vodka as well as infusions.
- Breckenridge Distillery: tours, tastings and sales available at the distillery (1925 Airport Road) from 11:00 a.m. 6:00 p.m.
 Monday-Saturday and at the Main Street Tasting Room (137 S. Main Street) 1:00 p.m. 7:00 p.m. Tuesday-Sunday.
- CapRock Organic Gin (located in Colorado Wine Country) is distilled using water from an aquifer that sits 10,500 feet above sea level. The distillery then uses apples for a fresh finish that blunts the usually harsh juniper kick.
