CZECH REPUBLIC	2018 is a special year to visit the Czech Republic as it celebrates 100 Years, with hundreds of cultural, social and sporting events to be offered.
	Czechoslovakia was founded in the aftermath of World War I as one of the successor states of Austria-Hungary. The central European country existed (with a brief interlude during World War II) from 28 October 1918 to 31 December 1992. On 1 January 1993, Czechoslovakia split to form the independent Czech and Slovak Republics. In 2018, both countries will be celebrating a hundred years of existence and commemorating the best that they have given the world together.
	The twenty years between the two world wars represent an exceptionally rich period in Czech history. At that time, Bohemia became one of the centres of modern European life. Czech towns such as Brno, Hradec Králové, Plzeň, Pardubice and Prague boast unique functionalist architecture, our galleries are home to pictures and sculptures by artists whose works are today some of the most appreciated in the world, and industrial production from that period, primarily cars and reproduction glass, captivate with the precision of their execution and the timelessness of their design. The inter-war era left behind a range of monuments, museums, period cafés and sporting traditions whose stories are waiting to be discovered.
	Would you prefer to visit the lively open-air museum in Rožnov pod Radhoštěm or to go on a tour taking you through original methods for brewing beer, the Czech national drink? Visitors will have the opportunity to walk in the footsteps of the first Czechoslovak president, Tomáš Garrigue Masaryk, and to visit border fortifications, while walks through the architectural visions of Adolf Loos, Josef Gočár and Jan Kotěra and the paintings of Alfons Mucha, František Kupka and Emil Fila will provide visitors with a memorable artistic experience. A key project for the celebrations is a joint Czech and Slovakian exhibition. On the Czech side, it will be presented by the National Museum, while the Slovak partners are the Slovak National Museum and the Slovak National Gallery.
	The Czech Philharmonic Orchestra will be marking the hundredth anniversary of the foundation of Czechoslovakia with an open-air concert. It will then go on to perform concerts of Leoš Janeček's opera "The Cunning Little Vixen" ("Liška Bystrouška") in Prague and New York, and is preparing an exhibition entitled "Bedřich Smetana – Má vlast" ("Bedřich Smetana – My Homeland") in honour of the Czechoslovak composer.

The Czech Republic is a landlocked nation state in Central Europe bordered by Germany to the west, Austria to the south, Slovakia to the east and Poland to the northeast. The Czech Republic covers an area of 78,866 square kilometres. The Czech landscape is very varied. Bohemia, to the west, consists of a basin drained by the Elbe and the Vltava rivers, surrounded by mostly low mountains, such as the Krkonoše range of the Sudetes. The highest point in the country, Sněžka at 1,603 m (5,259 ft), is located here. Moravia, the eastern part of the country, is also quite hilly. It is drained mainly by the Morava River, but it also contains the source of the Oder River. Water from the landlocked Czech Republic flows to three different seas: the North Sea, Baltic Sea and Black Sea. The Czech Republic can be subdivided into four ecoregions: the Western European broadleaf forests, Central European mixed forests, Pannonian mixed forests, and Carpathian montane conifer forests. The Czech Republic's official formal and short names at the United Nations are Česká republika and Česko in Czech, and the Czech Republic and Czechia in English.
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All these names derive from the name of the Czechs, the West Slavic ethnic group native to the Czech lands.
The total population is 10.6 million (2018)
The official language of the Czech Republic is Czech. It is spoken by approx. 10.6 million people. Czech falls within the West Slavic language group and therefore is similar to Polish, as well as Russian and Croatian. An interesting phenomenon is its great similarity to Slovak. Although the vast majority of the population of the Czech Republic (96%) speaks Czech, you can also hear Slovak, Russian, Polish, Ukrainian, or Vietnamese as these are languages of the largest national minorities in the Czech Republic. Tourists will usually make themselves understood in English.
The official currency of the Czech Republic is the Czech crown. Coins: CZK 1, CZK 2, CZK 5, CZK 10, CZK 20 and CZK 50 Banknotes: CZK 100, CZK 200, CZK 500, CZK 1000, CZK 2000 and CZK 5000 1 Crown = 100 halers, but you will be able to see these in the Czech Republic only on price labels. When you make payment you will not use halers or get them back in change. Prices are subject to rounding. For



	Many shops, restaurants as well as tourist centres accept Euros. But you should not be surprised that particularly in shops any change returned will be in Czech crowns. The current (April 2018) exchange rate is \$1 CDN = 16 Czech Crowns.
Tipping	Tipping is a standard 10%, and is not normally added to the bill. Don't be confused by the percentage figures listed at the bottom of the bill, by Czech law, a receipt must show the VAT paid (21% in most cases) and the VAT is already included in the final amount, and you should add about 10% to this (or more if you were really satisfied).
Government	The Czech Republic is a pluralist multi-party parliamentary representative democracy, with the President as head of state and Prime Minister as head of government. The Parliament is bicameral, with the Chamber of Deputies (200 members) and the Senate (81 members).
Documentation	Canadians need only a Passport to stay up to 90 days – no visa is required.
Time zone	The time zone for the whole country is Central European, which is generally six hours ahead of EST in Montreal and Toronto.
Health	Healthcare in the Czech Republic is similar in quality to other developed nations, but don't forget your health insurance.
Safety tips	By any measure, the Czech Republic as a whole generally has a low crime rate. For tourists, the Czech Republic is considered a safe destination to visit. The low crime rate makes most cities and towns very safe to walk around. The country is rated as the sixth safest country in the world.

CLIMATE	
General climate	Spring is usually cooler, the temperature from early March to late May ranges around 10°C on average. In these months the rainfall/snowfall in the Czech Republic averages about 161 mm. From March to May you can bask in approx. 479 hours of sunshine in the Czech Republic.
	The average summer temperature is about 17°C. However, this also includes mountainous areas! In the towns the temperature in June, July and August may reach as high as 35°C. For example, on Lysá Mountain in the Beskids there is no summer climate at all – after spring autumn appears straight away. So, if you want to cool down, it is a good idea to pop in there for example from sizzling Pálava.
	The first of the autumn months is September, which is still relatively warm, so it is referred to as the "Indian summer". Nonetheless, the beginning of October brings more rain and the average daily temperature falls to 10°C. The leaves on trees change colour and fall off, a fact described in the Czech name of November, which is



	"Listopad" meaning "leaf-fall". In the late autumn the first ground frosts are possible.
	Winter in the Czech Republic lasts roughly from December to February. Temperatures in towns may drop as low as -20°C, and in the mountains they plummet even further. Nevertheless, recent winters have been milder with temperatures slightly below zero – yet still cold enough to enjoy skiing in various places, such the Krkonoše Mountains, cross-country skiing for example in Šumava or just taking a romantic walk through snow-covered Prague.
Today's weather	Today (4 April 2018) Prague's temperature is 20C and mostly sunny.

Getting There	Visiting the Czech Republic is an easy trip from North America. In a quick 8.5 hours, you can be wandering the cobblestone streets of Prague and starting your adventure. Enjoy an overnight flight so that you never miss a beat or opt for a daytime flight. Either way, there are plenty of options of Prague flights for your next Czech Republic trip! The following airlines operate direct flights to Prague during the summer tourist season, May-October: Air Transat from Toronto (YYZ) & Montreal (YUL). Service operates weekly on a A330-300 aircraft. Air Canada Rouge from Toronto (YYZ). Service operates 3x per week on a Boeing 767 aircraft. Some flight offers may be applicable all-year-round. Otherwise, connecting flights are available frequently via major European airport hubs.
Cities	 Prague - is the fifth most visited city in Europe after London, Paris, Istanbul and Rome. It is the country's capital and largest city, and its large and beautiful historical core is listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. As the country's primate city, Prague naturally dominates most visitors' itineraries, and for good reason. A mix of the Gothic, Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, Art Nouveau, Art Deco, Brutalist, and Socialist, the capital is arguably one of Europe's most photogenic cities. Visitors should enjoy the Old Town and gawk at its medieval buildings, stroll across the Charles Bridge, and make their way through the Malá Strana up to the dominating Prague Castle for fantastic views of the city. Brno — the largest city in Moravia and the republic's second city, with several excellent museums, an accessible old town, a stunning cathedral, and the annual Grand Prix.



	České Budějovice – known also as Budweis, an attractive city in South Bohemia with an impressive old town square.
	Český Krumlov — a stunning medieval and Renaissance town in South Bohemia, home to the country's second largest palace, and is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.
	Karlovy Vary — a historic spa resort and the republic's largest, especially popular with German and Russian tourists, and the site of the country's most prestigious film festival.
	Kutná Hora — a historical medieval town in Central Bohemia, home to St. Barbara's Church, old silver mines, and the Sedlec Ossuary, decorated with tens of thousands of human remains. Its attractions are listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.
	Olomouc — a riverside university town with a thousand-year history, and the second largest historical centre in the Czech Republic after Prague.
	Ostrava — a vibrant and sometimes gritty blue-collar city with a strong subculture, and a long history of coal mining and steel production.
	Opava — the former capital of Silesia.
	Pilsen (Plzeň) — home of the original Pilsner Urquell beer and the Škoda Works, and the largest city in West Bohemia.
	Telč — a perfectly preserved Renaissance town centre surrounded by shallow man-made lakes. The town is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.
	Zlín - Beautiful example of functionalistic architecture inspired by garden cities of Le Corbusier and rebuilt by Baťa shoemaker family. The town is set in small hills, nature, zoo and spa literally behind a hill.
Distances	The country is relatively small, so the distances are not great. For instance, Prague to Brno is about 200kms, or two hours' drive.
Taxis	The average price per kilometre in a taxi is CZK 20. The final amount to be paid depends on the city, Prague usually being the most expensive. The price for the trip from downtown to the Prague airport ranges from CZK 500 to CZK 700.
	Unfair taxi drivers are everywhere, but their number in the Czech Republic is decreasing - to avoid the remaining ones, do not take a taxi directly in the street and rather call one by phone. Use only taxis that



	are clearly identified and ask about the price to your destination beforehand.
Trains	The Czech Republic has one of the most dense railway networks in Europe and a sophisticated system of bus transportation. Both trains and buses are reliable. The various Euro Rail Passes can be very effective for travel here.
Car Rental	All the major international car rental companies are available in city and airport locations.
Public Transport	In Prague you can use trams, buses, metro, ferries and even cable cars. Timetables, connections and other important information on Prague transport is available online. A comprehensive system of public transportation is also available in Brno, Ostrava, Pilsen, Liberec and other cities. With the modernisation of the fleet, an increasing number of public transport vehicles are barrier-free. The timetables include information on stations that have lifts or special paths making them accessible to disabled people. To use public transport in Prague, you must buy a ticket, choosing from one of the following options: The basic fare for adults costs CZK 32. If you are going to stay in Prague for one day, it is convenient to use a one-day ticket for CZK 110, if you are planning a weekend visit, it pays up to buy a three-day ticket for CZK 310. The ticket is always valid from the moment of its marking (the marking machines are in the metro, on the trams and buses) - it is enough to mark it once.

Surprising	The Czech Republic leases the Moldauhafen, a 30,000-square-metre (7.4-acre) lot in the middle of the Hamburg Docks, which was awarded to Czechoslovakia by Article 363 of the Treaty of Versailles, to allow the landlocked country a place where goods transported down river could be transferred to seagoing ships. The territory reverts to Germany in 2028.
History	 The Czech Republic includes the historical territories of Bohemia, Moravia, and Czech Silesia. The Czech state was formed in the late 9th century as the Duchy of Bohemia under the Great Moravian Empire. After the fall of the Empire in 907, the centre of power transferred from Moravia to Bohemia under the Přemyslid dynasty. In 1002, the duchy was formally recognized as part of the Holy Roman Empire, becoming the Kingdom of Bohemia in 1198 and reaching its greatest territorial extent in the 14th century. Besides Bohemia itself, the king of Bohemia ruled the lands of the Bohemian Crown, he had a vote in the election of the Holy Roman Emperor, and Prague was the imperial seat in periods between the 14th and 17th century. In the Hussite wars of the 15th century driven by the Protestant Bohemian Reformation, the kingdom faced economic embargoes and defeated five consecutive crusades proclaimed by the leaders of the Roman Catholic Church. Following the Battle of Mohács in 1526, the whole Crown of Bohemia was gradually integrated into the Habsburg Monarchy alongside the Archduchy of Austria and the Kingdom of Hungary. The Protestant Bohemian Revolt (1618–20) against the Catholic Habsburgs led to the Thirty Years' War. After the Battle of the White Mountain, the Habsburgs consolidated their rule, eradicated Protestantism and re-imposed Roman Catholicism, and also adopted a policy of gradual Germanization. With the dissolution of the Holy Roman Empire in 1806, the Bohemian Kingdom became part of the Austrian Empire and the Czech language experienced a revival as a consequence of widespread romantic nationalism. In the 19th century, the Czech lands became the industrial powerhouse of the monarchy and were subsequently the core of the Republic of Czechoslovakia, which was formed in 1918 following the collapse of the Austro-Hungarian Empire after World War I. Czechoslovakia remained the only democracy in this part of Europe in the interwar peri



	 occupied by Germany in World War II, while the Slovak region became the Slovak Republic; Czechoslovakia was liberated in 1945 by the armies of the Soviet Union and the United States. The Czech country lost the majority of its German-speaking inhabitants after they were expelled following the war. The Communist Party of Czechoslovakia won the 1946 elections. Following the 1948 coup d'état, Czechoslovakia became a one-party communist state under Soviet influence. In 1968, increasing dissatisfaction with the regime culminated in a reform movement known as the Prague Spring, which ended in a Soviet-led invasion. Czechoslovakia remained occupied until the 1989 Velvet Revolution, when the communist regime collapsed, and market economy was reintroduced. On 1 January 1993, Czechoslovakia peacefully dissolved, with its
	constituent states becoming the independent states of the Czech Republic and Slovakia. The Czech Republic joined NATO in 1999 and the EU in 2004.

	ponds. During this fishing, you can enjoy the water-soaked atmosphere. This tradition dates back 800 years. There are about 21,000 ponds in the Czech Republic!
	The Largest Czech Pond If you truly want to enjoy pond fishing, there is only one place in the Czech Republic to go – the Třeboň Region in South Bohemia . Třeboň is 140km from Prague. It takes 100 minutes to get there by car. However, the journey is well worth it. In the Třeboň Region alone, fishing takes place at approximately 200 ponds every year. From the weekend of Friday, October 13th to Sunday, October 15th, fishing will take place at the largest Czech pond, Rožmberk Pond. Fishing in the so-called South Bohemia sea, as the Rožmberk Pond is sometimes nicknamed, is a huge fishing and social event not only for fishermen but also for the thousands of visitors, who come here annually. This year's pond fishing will start at 7:00am with the first tug of the rod, on all three
	days. Fishing is followed by sorting, weighing and marinating of the fish. You can look forward to a rich, gastronomic program, including the sale of live fish.
Horse riding	There are nearly a hundred horse riding stables listed on the Czech website! For horse lovers, a visit to the National Stud Farm in Kladruby nad Labem is a must. You can enjoy tours of the stables, chateau, coach storage and harness storage, the museum of horse breeding in Kladruby, the forester's house with a simulator of a ride in a coach – and if you still have some energy left, you can climb a lookout tower. The stud farm is a breeding stable of white horses of the Old Kladruby breed.
Hiking	One of the most popular Czech sports is hiking, mainly in the Czech mountains. The word for "tourist" in the Czech language, turista, also means "trekker" or "hiker". For hikers, thanks to the more than 120-year-old tradition, there is a
	Czech Hiking Markers System of trail blazing, that has been adopted by



countries worldwide. There is a network of around 40,000 km of marked short- and long-distance trails crossing the whole country and all the Czech mountains.
One of the nicest places to take a walk in Prague is Petřín, whose imaginary crown is the famous lookout tower, nicknamed the little Eiffel Tower.
The fairytale Průhonice Park, which is one of the largest naturally landscaped parks in Europe, is only a few kilometres from Prague city limits.
The mountain path along the River Vydra is a beautiful place for all fans of the enchanting countryside of Šumava.
There is no other way to get to the Punkva Caves and the bottom of the Macocha Abyss than on foot and the same is true if you want to wander among the massive sandstone towers of the rock cities in Adršpach or the Prachov Rocks in Bohemian Paradise!
Cycling experiences: Tried and tested routes for hardcore cyclists and for easy riders, trails full of experiences, long-distance and even thematic routes – which one will you choose?
If your bike has become a constant partner on trips through the flatlands and hills, the Czech Republic has lots of great tips to offer you. You can for example set out by bike from Vienna to Brno or from the German borders along the Ohře or along the banks of the Elbe right up to its source.
The witches' cycle path will take you past places where inquisition trials were held in times long past. Single track trails will take you to places where you really can give your body a thorough workout and all lovers of adrenaline sports will be supremely jealous of you; discover these in the Rychleby and Jizera Mountains.
In winter there is downhill skiing: The ski centres in all mountain areas of the Czech Republic offer fun for the adventurous and for those who are more easygoing.
You will find slopes for experienced skiers in the Czech mountains and training slopes where children will also feel at home. Ski centres also offer lots of new things every year, ranging from sledging, snowtubing and new snow parks, right through to new cable cars. The most popular ski centres in the Czech Republic are Skiresort Černá hora and Skiareál Špindlerův Mlýn in the Krkonoše Mountains.

Arts	National Gallery, Prague
	Discover the largest art collections in the Czech Republic! An introduction to the National Gallery in Prague will be a fantastic
	experience. The works are divided according to historical periods and various artistic styles, and you will, in addition, recognize a number of



important buildings, monasteries and palaces in Prague.
www.ngprague.cz The history of the National Gallery began to unfold in February 1796,
when the Society of Patriotic Friends of the Arts was founded in Prague.
Those taking part in its creation were Kolovrat, the Šternberks and
Nostics as members of the patriotically-oriented Czech nobility, and
enlightened townspeople. The organization then established two
important institutions: the Academy of Arts, and the first publicly
accessible gallery in Prague.
Today, the National Gallery takes care of a number of permanent
exhibits and organizes numerous exhibitions and cultural events.
In Sternberg Palace in Hradčany you will find a collection of European
art from antiquity through the Baroque. The works on display include
those by Tintoretto, Ribera, El Greco, Rubens, van Dyck and
Rembrandt, as well as one of the most famous paintings in the world,
The Feast of the Rosary by Albrecht Dürer.
In St. Agnes Convent in Old Town you can see an exhibition of
medieval and early Renaissance art from the Czech Republic and
Central Europe. On display in the authentic environment of the first
monastery of the Poor Clares in Bohemia, probably founded in 1231 by
St. Agnes Czech, are rare panel paintings by Master Theodoric or a painting of the Madonna and Child by Lucas Cranach the Elder.
Baroque art is on display inside the Schwarzenberg Palace on Castle
Square, with paintings by Hans von Aachen, Karel Škréta, Petr Brandl
and Jan Kupecký. You can also see a graphical cabinet with a unique
collection of the work of Václav Hollar and an exhibit of Baroque crafts
from the collections of the Museum of Decorative Arts.
At the Fairgrounds Palace, in its time the first functionalist building in
Prague, the famous Slav Epic by Art Nouveau painter Alfons Mucha
was introduced to the public for the first time in 1928. It is still on display
here even now; in addition you can also see the paintings, sculptures
and applied art of Czech and foreign artists of the 20th and 21st
centuries. You will discover here the works of French Impressionists,
Gustav Klimt, Oskar Kokoschka, Edvard Munch, Egon Schiele and
Joan Miró.
The art of Asia and the ancient Mediterranean is on display on Old
Town Square in Kinský Palace, the most beautiful rococo building in
Prague.
Museum of Art in Olomouc
The Olomouc Museum of Art: a thousand year of artistic culture
Explore the important Romanesque monument of Přemysl Castle,
including the Romanesque Bishop's Palace of Henry Zdík as well as the
mysteries of modern art. The Olomouc Archdiocesan Museum
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Music	 showcases the art of the 12th to 18th centuries. The second part of the museum, the Museum of Modern Art, has among other things prepared the Art Lover's House exhibition for you, in which you pass through an interior from the turn of the century. After this spiritual advancement, enjoy a coffee on the museum terrace with a view of one of the dominant features in Olomouc, the Church of Our Lady of the Snows. http://www.olmuart.cz The wealth of musical culture in the Czech Republic lies in the long-term high-culture classical music tradition during all historical periods, especially in the Baroque, Classicism, Romantic, modern classical music and in the traditional folk music of Bohemia, Moravia and Silesia. Since the early era of artificial music, Czech musicians and composers have often been influenced the folk music of the region and dances (e.g. the polka, which originated in Bohemia). Among the most notable Czech composers are Adam Michna, Jan
	Dismas Zelenka, Jan Václav Antonín Stamic, Jiří Antonín Benda, Jan Křtitel Vaňhal, Josef Mysliveček, Heinrich Biber, Antonín Rejcha, František Xaver Richter, František Brixi and Jan Ladislav Dussek in baroque era, Bedřich Smetana and Antonín Dvořák in romanticism, Gustav Mahler, Josef Suk, Leoš Janáček, Bohuslav Martinů, Vítězslav Novák, Zdeněk Fibich, Alois Hába, Viktor Ullmann, Ervín Schulhoff, Pavel Haas, Josef Bohuslav Foerster in modern classical music, Miloslav Kabeláč and Petr Eben in contemporary classical music. The most famous Czech musical works are Smetana's The Bartered Bride and Má vlast, Dvořák's New World Symphony, Rusalka and Slavonic Dances or Janáček's Sinfonietta and operas, above all Jenůfa. The most famous music festival in the country is Prague Spring International Music Festival of classical music, a permanent showcase for outstanding performing artists, symphony orchestras and chamber music ensembles of the world.
Film	Karlovy Vary International Film Festival is one of the oldest in the world and has become Central and Eastern Europe's leading film event. It is also one of few film festivals have been given competitive status by the FIAPF. Other film festivals held in the country include Febiofest, Jihlava International Documentary Film Festival, One World Film Festival, Zlín Film Festival and Fresh Film Festival.
Museums	Discover the treasures of Prague's museums and galleries! Prague's wealth doesn't lie only in its churches, palaces and magnificent gardens. It's also well worth exploring the priceless artworks that are hidden in its dozens of museums and galleries. Discover a world of prehistoric finds, paintings by medieval masters, elegant High Baroque statues, Renaissance jewellery, 19th century technical marvels, and pieces by contemporary artists for whom Prague is a unique showcase for their work.



	National Museum Every capital has its National Museum. Prague is no exception, and you will find the monumental neo-Renaissance building at the upper end of Wenceslas Square. The National Museum is the largest museum complex in the Czech Republic and possesses an impressive collection from many fields of endeavour. Though its main building is currently undergoing extensive renovation, its collections can still be explored. Among the most popular are the Náprstek Museum of Asian, African and American Cultures, and museums dedicated to the world renowned composers Bedřich Smetana and Antonín Dvořák. Meanwhile, the National Technical Museum contains several of the Czech lands' technical treasures, such as the first automobile produced here, model fighter planes and astronomical instruments used by Tycho de Brahe. www.nm.cz
	Museum Kampa If modern art is your thing, pop along to Museum Kampa. This unique gallery, which is located in the Sovový Mlýny building, is home to the largest collection of paintings by the world-renowned artist František Kupka. Make sure to venture out of the museum and take in its exterior, which is home to original sculptures and – of all things – glow-in-the-dark penguins on the bank of the Vltava. Contemporary works await you at the progressive DOX Centre for Contemporary Art in Holešovice, which regularly runs controversial exhibitions and is a big hit with visitors.
	Prague Castle Do you prefer gems that are a few centuries older? If so, don't neglect to visit the Prague Castle Picture Gallery, which houses the collection of Emperor Rudolf II (one of the greatest of art lovers), including pieces by such masters as Rubens and Tizian. While at the Castle, you can also explore the collections of Lobkowicz Palace, one of the biggest in Europe. Among its treasures are original scores with notes by Mozart and Beethoven. Meanwhile, you can view the works of 19th century Czech masters of landscape painting at the City Gallery Prague's spaces at the elegant Troja Chateau.

	Old Town Square
	Old Town Square draws the greatest number of visitors in Prague as it
	boasts meticulously preserved buildings and monuments: the Church of
	Our Lady in front of Tyn, The Old Town City Hall and the Baroque
	church St. Nicolas. One building that truly dominates the square is the
	Old Town City Hall, which dates back to 1338. In 1410 the astronomical
	clock was added to the Hall with a chronometer and the zodiac below;
	this clock is a worldwide attraction.
	Tyn Church
	This Gothic church from the mid-14th century is perhaps the second
	signature landmark in Old Town Square (after the Astronomical Clock).
	It was the main church during the time of the Hussites. The interior of
	the church, especially the altar, is one of the most elaborate ones in the
	Czech Republic; its centrepiece is the portrayal of the rise of Virgin Mary
	to Heaven.



	Kinsky Palace Kinsky Palace On one of the most beautiful squares in Europe, sits the lovely neo Rococo Kinsky Palace with its delicate pink and white stucco facade. Between 1755-65 it was built for Jan Arnost Goltz, on the grounds of two old hotels. Goltz wished for a Rococo palace that would feature two entrances under two balconies and a balustrade on the first floor. The Kinsky family would become the new owners after the death of Jan Arnost Goltz
	The House at the Minute The House at the Minute In the magical Old Town Square sits the lovely Renaissance pearl, The House at the Minute. Covered in ornate Sgraffito decorations depicting Greek mythology as well as references to biblical and Renaissance legends, this house is easily recognizable with such an impressive facade. The House at the Minute was built at the beginning of the 15th century as a house in the late Gothic style and was supposedly a tobacconist's shop.
	Estates Theatre One of the most beautiful theatres in Europe, the Estates was built at the end of the 18th century in midst of the cultural enlightenment across Europe. Its construction was driven by the idea that Prague needed a theater to enhance its charm, according to Count Frantisek Antonin Nostitz Rieneck, who financed the construction. Throughout the years it has housed many performances by world famous artists and composers, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart among them.
	Charles University Karolinum The Karolinum is the original building of Charles University, Central Europe's oldest university, founded by Charles IV in 1348. Throughout the centuries many distinguished figures, such as Jan Hus held lectures at the Karolinum. Charles University has facilities all over Prague today and the Karolinum is the seat of the administration of Charles University and the venue for university graduation ceremonies. Art and photography exhibitions often grace the Gothic halls.
	The House at the Black Madonna Built from a reinforced concrete skeleton from the School of Chicago, the House at the Black Madonna is truly an engineering feat and delight. Architect Josef Gočár finished the house between 1911 and 1912, adhering to strict codes from the city of Prague regarding the historical building authorities. To try to incorporate a Cubist building into the historical Old Town proved difficult, as surrounding buildings were protected and mainly Baroque in style.
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The Municipal House

The Municipal House is the Art Nouveau gem of Prague. Adjacent to the Powder Tower, the Municipal House is the beginning of the royal mile. It was built on the grounds of a former Royal Court Palace between 1905-1911 and houses a large concert hall. Both exterior and interior are elaborately decorated with Art Nouveau elements and motifs; some of the greatest Art Nouveau artists, including Alfons Mucha, have left their mark on this remarkable piece of design and architecture.

Náměstí Republiky

Náměstí Republiky translates to Republic Square, and this beautiful square indeed exemplifies the variety of the beauty and history of the Czech Republic. With buildings ranging in age and architectural style from the 1475 Powder Tower (Prašná brána), refinished and redecorated in the 1800's in a highly romanticized Neo-Gothic style, to the austere Baroque Church of St. Joseph tucked alongside the Neo-Romanesque former barracks building now housing the Palladium shopping centre

The Stone Bell House

The Stone Bell House is just one of the remarkable buildings located on Old Town Square and one of the oldest monuments in Prague housing short-term exhibitions of the City Gallery Prague. The oldest part of the building dates back to the second half of the 13th century. Only in the 1970s and 1980s during extensive reconstruction when the Neo-Baroque façade from the 19th century was pulled down the Gothic decorated façade was uncovered.

Powder Tower

This impressive monument is one of the 13 original entrances to Old Town. The Gothic building dates back to the reign of King Vladislav II Jagiello in 1475 when it was known as the Mountain Tower, it was later used to store gunpowder in the 17th century, hence the current name. It is an elaborate 65-meter tower, which hosts a permanent exhibition of many other beautiful historic towers in Prague. 186 stone steps will take you up to a gallery.

Klementinum

The Klementinum sits on over 2 hectares and is one of the largest complexes in Europe and is home to the Czech Republic's National Library. Situated in the romantic area of Prague's Old Town, the Klementinum dates back to the 11th century when a chapel was erected and dedicated to St. Clement. In the middle ages, the complex became



a Dominican monastery and afterwards in 1556 a Jesuit college and was at one point the third largest Jesuit college

Hotel Pariz Hotel Paris

One of the most beautiful buildings and hotels in Prague, Hotel Paris is the work of architect Jan Veirych. Finished in 1904, the splendid hotel featured grand elements of the Art Nouveau movement (the interior was designed by A. Pfeifer and the ceramic mosaics by J. Kohler), such as colorful ceramic mosaics, an elegant staircase with an ornate wrought iron railing, brass motifs, etched glass mirrors and windows, and golden intricate light fixtures and chandeliers.

Rudolfinum Gallery

The Rudolfinum Gallery is a spacious and attractive art gallery situated in the multi-purpose Rudolfinum cultural complex, which houses a gorgeous concert hall and a grand turn of the last century café. J. Schulz, who also designed the National Theatre in Prague, which is a beautiful example of Historicist architecture in central Europe, designed this neo Renaissance building. The location of the Rudolfinum complex is an important one as it creates a cultural centre in the heart of Prague

Bedřich Smetana Museum

Located in Old Town and situated on the Vltava River close to the world famous Charles Bridge is the Bedřich Smetana Museum. This museum is housed in a gorgeous neo Renaissance building that was formerly the Old Town Water Works. The building was constructed in 1883-4 and features a beautiful sgraffito façade designed by famous Czech painters Mikoláš Aleš and František Ženíšek that makes the building unforgettable.

The Rudolfinum & the Czech Philharmonic Orchestra

The Rudolfinum is a multi-purpose cultural complex, which houses a gorgeous concert hall, home to the renowned Czech Philharmonic Orchestra, a grand turn of the last century café and a spacious art gallery that displays temporary international contemporary art exhibitions. The cultural complex features four rooms for music performances including Dvořák Hall, which is known for its perfect acoustics

Old Town Bridge Tower

The Old Town Bridge Tower is one of the most beautiful Gothic buildings in Europe. The tower was built in the second half of the 14th century together with the Charles Bridge on its right bank side not only as a fortification, but also as a certain type of triumphal arch. The tower



	was namely on the route of the coronation parades leading to St. Vitus Cathedral at Prague Castle.
	Museum of Decorative Arts Located in a cultural square that houses the Rudolfinum Gallery and concert hall, the Academy of Decorative Arts and the Faulty of Philosophy is the Prague Museum of Decorative Arts. This splendid museum was erected at the very end of the 1800s and houses a wonderful collection of all things decorative from the Renaissance to the mid-19th century including glass, furniture, textiles, jewelry, watches, clocks and more.
Beaches	Havel Market Detail One of the oldest markets in the city, Havel Market dates back to 1232. Originally selling only produce, the market has changed over the years, mainly with tourists in mind. Lately it seems though that the produce stalls are starting to outnumber the souvenir stalls, which is a good thing as many stalls sell the same tourist junk you can find all over Old Town. Some stalls however offer inexpensive handmade Czech crystal and glass jewelry and tasty traditional spa wafers Although the Czech Republic is landlocked, you can still spend a day on
beaches	the beach – at one of the many lakes and reservoirs in the country. Here are a few suggestions:
	Seč Dam Seč Dam in East Bohemia near Pardubice offers visitors the opportunity to swim, dive, fish, surf, and yacht in natural surroundings. The dam lies in a protected landscape area, which is why the surrounding deep forests are criss-crossed with numerous hiking, cycling, and cross-country skiing trails. There are even equestrian trails for horses.
	Vranov Dam In South Moravia, not far from Podyjí National Park, lies a dam with a reservoir that is deservedly regarded to be one of the most beautiful bodies of water in the Czech Republic. The thirty-kilometre-long reservoir with warm, clear water is situated in the gorgeous valley beneath the proud baroque chateau, Vranov nad Dyjí, and offers excellent conditions for swimming and water sports. What's more is that even in the hottest of summers, the quality of the water in Vranov Dam is some of the best in the Czech Republic.
	Máchovo Lake Although this body of water in Bohemian Paradise is called a lake, it is actually an artificial reservoir, or fishpond. In fact, it is one of the largest



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	fishponds in the Czech Republic and was established as early as the 14th century. Máchovo Lake is highly popular among tourists. In the summer, there are four beaches open, with countless attractions for young and old alike.
Nature	 Explore caves and rock cities, climb to the tops of mountains and observation points – it's easy to get close to Nature here! A wonderful rest in the open air, beautiful scenery, and the charming corners of national parks – all that can be had from trips in the Czech countryside. Places you will never forget and where you will always be happy to go back to – such as the fairy-tale landscape of the Bohemian Switzerland National Park, the gorges of the Adršpach Rock City or Punkevní Cave in the Moravian Karst. The cold northern character is exuded from the shadows of Boubín Forest in Šumava, while you will be surprised by the warm, almost Mediterranean character of the landscape in the Dolní Morava Biosphere Reserve. A number of geologically interesting sites can be enjoyed up close in the Casel and gaparts in Taphovalie ragion.
Parks	GeoLoci geopark in Tachovsko region. There are four national parks in the Czech Republic. The oldest is Krkonoše National Park (Biosphere Reserve), and the others are Šumava National Park (Biosphere Reserve), Podyjí National Park, Bohemian Switzerland.
	Krkonoše National Park Visit the Krkonoše National Park – an Arctic island in the middle of Europe! The Krkonoše National Park is one of the most valuable natural areas in all of Central Europe. The highest Czech mountain range, it is a unique mosaic of ecosystems which have remained here as a reminder of the ancient glacial past. Come explore this wonderful landscape with high mountain slopes, flat ridges, alpine meadows with colourful wildflowers, and mysterious moorlands, all presided over by the "Czech Matterhorn" – the highest Czech mountain Sněžka. Awaiting you is a terrific trip to an unspoilt landscape full of distant views, steep climbs, and also perfectly marked hiking trails of all difficulty levels.
	Šumava National Park Climb on the green roof of Europe in the Šumava National Park! Few places in Central Europe offer such a harmonious landscape as the Šumava National Park. The deep forests on the Czech-Bavarian border are so vast as to form the largest forested area on the continent. A combination of centuries-old primaeval forests, crystal-clear glacial lakes, and mysterious peat bogs creates a uniquely poetic place for active holidays at all times of year.



	Podyjí National Park
	Get to know the "Czech Amazon" in the Podyjí National Park Even though it is the smallest Czech national park, the Podyjí National Park is among the most important natural sites in Central Europe. Here you will find an exceptionally well-preserved river valley in a richly wooded landscape full of breathtaking scenery. Among the meanders of the Dyje (Thaya) River is a unique reserve which will enchant you with its charm, warm climate and the many ways to enjoy its beauty.
	Bohemian Switzerland
	Enjoy a trip into the fairytale landscape of Bohemian Switzerland A mystical landscape of pine forests and deep valleys, with majestic rock towers, gates, walls, ravines, rock cities and labyrinths rising up from them. This description fits the Bohemian Switzerland National Park precisely. This empire of rocks is home to the rarest of animals and also plays host to remarkable plants.
Gardens	Garden Food Festival Olomouc
	Lovers of traditional cuisine or gastronomic explorers as well as fans of local specialties like Loštické (Olomouc) smelly cheese, and demanding gourmets seeking an experience for their taste buds can head to Smetana Park in the center of historic Olomouc for the Garden Food Festival. <u>www.gardenfoodfestival.cz</u>
Historical Sites	The Czech Republic is a treasure trove of castles, palaces,
	monasteries, and other places of historical significance. A complete listing of the country's castles and palaces is simply impossible, so here are a just a few recommendations Karlštejn Castle , just outside of Prague, is a huge pull for curious tourists, attracted by its Gothic architecture perched above the banks of the Vltava River. The Lednice-Valtice palaces and gardens near the Slovak and Austrian borders are the massive former residences of the princes of Liechtenstein, and is today a combined UNESCO World Heritage Site. Lednice is known for its especially massive English gardens, while Valtice, for its fanciful faux-Roman architecture. Not far from these palaces in the town of Slavkov u Brna is the Austerlitz Battlefield, where Napoleon decidedly crushed the Austrian and Russian armies in 1805. To the west in South Bohemia near the town of Jindřichův Hradec is the Červená Lhota château , an iconic Renaissance palace starkly painted red, standing in the middle of a pond and linked only by a stone bridge. Hluboká Castle , not far from České Budějovice, is another massive palace, dating from the Middle Ages but heavily redesigned in the 19th century. To the very north of the country are the impressive ruins of Trosky



Castle, whose Gothic ruins give dramatic vistas to the Bohemian
Paradise.
Kašperk Castle, located near the Bohemian Forest, is another Gothic
legacy of Emperor Charles IV's reign.

OTHER ACTIVITIES	
Shopping	The Czech Republic is a country with one of the largest concentrations of shopping centres per capita in the world. The largest shopping centres are in the largest Czech city: Prague. Soon, the reconstruction of one of the largest ones, the Chodov Shopping Centre (right by a Metro station of the same name), will be completed. There are already more than 200 stores there and after the extension is complete, there will be more than 300 stores. You will also find luxury brands there, such as Barbour or Karl Lagerfeld. Another popular stop for shopaholics is Palladium, which is in the city centre, opposite the Municipal House, or Na Příkopě Street, where you can find anything you can think of on a single street. Even a luxurious multilevel toy store! You will not be disappointed when you visit other Czech cities, such as Brno , or Ostrava . For example, the Nová Karolina shopping centre recently opened in the centre of Ostrava in place of a former factory. Most of the shops from the centre moved under the roof of Nová Karolina and people were worried that the centre would become empty. However, the free spaces in the centre have been filled up with cafes and interesting restaurants. One of the most popular shopping centres in Brno is no doubt Galerie Vaňkovka, built in an old factory building near the main train station. The shopping gallery has a lot of shops with various goods.
	Pařížská Street – Prague Pařížská (Paris) Street has no equal in the Czech Republic. It is not a coincidence that it bears the name of Paris. The street, running through the Jewish quarter from the Old Town Square to the Vltava River, was built at the turn of the 19th and 20th centuries as a Parisian boulevard. The street is full of luxurious stores and it is lined with houses with representative facades where you can enjoy a walk and shopping in the shade of the trees. When walking along the street, you can experience an atmosphere of peace and luxury. Global luxurious brands literally fight for a spot on Pařížská. You can find brands such as Hermés, Dolce&Gabbana, Louis Vuitton, Prada, Gucci, Jimmy Choo, Cartier, Dior, Burberry and more.
Markets	The Christmas Markets in the Czech Republic are beloved! Prague You can find several Christmas markets in Prague. Of course, the most



	famous is on Old Town Square, which is held from November 29 to January 6. The thick hot chocolate, so thick that it can harden in your cup after a few minutes in the cold weather is the biggest gourmet experience, as well as the Old Bohemian trdelník, dried apples, mulled wine, baked tea and other goodies. Market stalls are open every day from 10 am to 10 pm. You'll find other markets on Wenceslas Square, the Republic Square (náměstí Republiky) or Peace Square (náměstí Míru). Český Krumlov Český Krumlov is shrouded in a wonderful Christmas veil in the Advent season and always immerses its visitors in the mysterious atmosphere. A rich program drawing on Czech folk customs and traditions is complemented by different concerts and fairy tales for children. Naturally, there are also the Old Bohemian Christmas markets with punch, mulled wine and Christmas cookies that provide the whole town with a wonderful aroma daily. You can visit them from November 27 to January 6. The last Advent Sunday (December 20) will be marked by musical gifts that the musicians of Český Krumlov will give out as well as traditionally singing Silent Night along with citizens of all nationalities. Farmers' Markets In Prague, farmers markets operate in different parts of the city. In the district of Vinohrady they regularly take place at Jiřího z Poděbrad Square, on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays. On the banks of the Vltava river bank they are held every Saturday from 8 am to 2 pm at a place called Náplavka. Today, the traditional Prague farmer's market is the market on Saturdays at Dejvické náměstí Square which is popularly nicknamed Kulaťák.
	 What can you buy at farmers' markets? Vegetables, fruits, herbs and spices, meats and sausages, cheeses and other dairy products, bread and pastries, eggs, sweet desserts, cider and juices, spirits and wine, honey, flowers and seedlings and much more. You can also find a number of towns and villages outside Prague which are regular hosts of farmers' markets. In South Bohemia, this includes Jindřichův Hradec, Vysočina Region, Havlíčkův Brod and the Wallachian town of Vsetín. Farmers' markets are also organized by the Bohemian metropolis of Plzeň. The Vegetable Market in Brno has a great, centuries-old tradition.
Nightlife	Prague is an interesting city with plenty of sightseeing opportunities, cultural events and such. But what happens when the sun goes down on Central Europe's preserved gem? What is the nightlife in Prague like? Prague becomes a different city full of creeping shadows in dimly lit lanes, circling bats above your head and a definite sense of crazy fun.



	From traditional boar halls with appardian playars to algoly modern

	dance clubs, Prague nightlife is alive and kicking until the sun comes
	up, and what better way to see Charles Bridge then at sunrise (plus the

Food	 Czech cuisine is marked by a strong emphasis on meat dishes. Pork is quite common; beef and chicken are also popular. Goose, duck, rabbit and wild game are served. Fish is rare, with the occasional exception of fresh trout and carp, which is served at Christmas. Some popular Czech dishes include: Vepřo knedlo zelo: roast pork with bread dumplings and stewed cabbage Svíčková na smetaně: roast sirloin of beef with steamed dumplings and cream of vegetable sauce Rajská (omáčka): beef in tomato sauce, traditionally served with dumplings Koprová: beef in dill sauce, traditionally served with dumplings Pečená kachna: roast duck with bread or potato dumplings and braised red cabbage Guláš: a variety of beef and pork goulash stews, served with dumplings or bread



	Smažený sýr: fried cheese, typically served with potatoes or french fries and tartar sauce
	Bramboráky: potato pancakes, traditionally served with sour cabbage There is also a large variety of local sausages, wurst, pâtés, and smoked and cured meats.
	Czech desserts include a wide variety of whipped cream, chocolate,
	and fruit pastries and tarts, crêpes, creme desserts and cheese,
	poppy-seed-filled and other types of traditional cakes such as buchty, koláče and štrúdl.
Drink	Czech beer has a long and important history. The first brewery is
	known to have existed in 993 and the Czech Republic has the highest
	beer consumption per capita in the world. The famous "pilsner style beer" (pils) originated in the western Bohemian city of Plzeň, where the world's first-ever blond lager Pilsner Urquell is still being produced,
	making it the inspiration for more than two-thirds of the beer produced in the world today.
	Further south the town of České Budějovice, known as Budweis in
	German, lent its name to its beer, eventually known as Budweiser
	Budvar.
	Apart from these and other major brands, the Czech Republic also
	boasts a growing number of top quality small breweries and
	mini-breweries seeking to continue the age-old tradition of quality and
	taste, whose output matches the best in the world.
	The Czech Republic has a number of beer festivals, including: Czech Beer Festival (the biggest Czech beer festival, it is usually 17 days long
	and held every year in May in Prague), Pilsner Fest (every year in
	August in Plzeň), The Olomoucký pivní festival (in Olomouc) or festival
	Slavnosti piva v Českých Budějovicích (in České Budějovice).
	Wine : Tourism is slowly growing around the Southern Moravian region too, which has been producing wine since the Middle Ages; about 94%
	of vineyards in the Czech Republic are Moravian. Aside from slivovitz,
	Czech beer and wine, the Czechs also produce two unique liquors,
	Fernet Stock and Becherovka. Kofola is a non-alcoholic domestic cola
	soft drink which competes with Coca-Cola and Pepsi in popularity.
Restaurants	Much of the social life under the First Republic took place at the café
	table. Journalists obtained tips for their articles, artists discussed the
	quality of their own or foreign works, and politicians formulated their declarations in cafés. Students met with their idols, chatted with them,
	and even created important ideas about their future career steps. Many
	of the cafés are still emanating the First Republic atmosphere. To name
	just a few: Café Louvre, the famous Slavia, Café Imperial, Café Orient in
	the Cubist House of the Black Madonna and Café Platýz.



Café Imperial - The Art Deco café from 1914 is renowned for its cuisine.
Café Louvre - One of the most famous Prague cafés frequented by Franz Kafka, Albert Einstein, Franz Werfel and Karel Čapek.
Café Orient - A café built in the Cubist style according to the project of Josef Gočár was closed only ten years after its opening due to the outdatedness of Cubism. Today, first-rate coffee can be smelled there again and the interior is furnished like at the time of its creation.

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
