




**ORLANDO**

<b>Location</b>	<p>At the approximate geographic center of the state of Florida in the U.S.A., the three-county Orlando area consists of 2,856 square miles making it the approximate size of Austin, Texas or Stockholm, Sweden. Orlando is situated approximately 150 miles from the Florida/Georgia border to the north, 50 miles from the Atlantic Coast to the east, 75 miles from the Gulf Coast to the west, and 370 miles from the Florida Keys at the southern tip of the state.</p>
<b>Geography</b>	<p>The region Orlando occupies is generally low-lying, the only exception being minor sand hills formed by wave action in earlier geological eras when sea level was higher. Orlando is rivaled only by the Twin Cities in the number of natural lakes to be found in its metropolitan area. The Orlando area is home to more than 100 lakes.</p>
<b>Name</b>	<p>The real namesake was a man named Orlando Rees, who operated a sugar mill and plantation about thirty miles north of the modern city; An alternative explanation for the name is a founders of the city was enamored with Shakespeare, and named the city for the hero of As You Like It. Rosalind Avenue runs though downtown, as Rosalind ran through Orlando's heart.</p>
<b>Population</b>	<p>The population of Metro Orlando is approximately 1.8 million. Metro Orlando consists of Orange, Osceola, Seminole and Lake counties. The population of Orange County is approximately 1 million</p>
<b>Language</b>	<p>English</p>
<b>Currency</b>	<p>US Dollars; the current exchange rate at 17 October 2008 is 84 cents US to the Canadian Dollar</p>

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<b>Tipping</b>	The custom of tipping is a common practice in Orlando: 15% to 20% for waiters; 10% to 15% for taxi drivers; \$1 per bag for bellmen. Occasionally gratuities are automatically added to restaurant checks, but not usually.
<b>Dress</b>	Clothing styles in Orlando are as varied as any other major city in the world. Styles of dress ranging from comfortable and casual to elegant and stylish will be seen in all parts of the city. Air conditioning is a way of life during Orlando summers, making all clothing comfortable indoors.
<b>Documentation</b>	Passports are now required for Canadian visitors arriving by air; currently Canadians only require a birth certificate and drivers license if driving across the border, but a Passport is still strongly recommended and will become mandatory in June 2009
<b>Time zone</b>	Eastern Standard Time, same as Toronto
<b>Health</b>	Excellent services available but ensure that you have travelers health insurance as health costs in the US can be very high
<b>Safety tips</b>	Orlando is relatively safe for the tourist. One should use the same precautions as when traveling anywhere - try not to travel alone and avoid deserted areas at night

<b>CLIMATE</b>	
<b>General climate</b>	Orlando has a warm and humid subtropical climate, and there are two major seasons each year. One of those seasons is hot and rainy, lasting from April until October (roughly coinciding with the Atlantic hurricane season). The other is a cooler season (November through March) that brings more moderate temperatures and less frequent rainfall. October - May Average Daily Temperatures Days - Low 70s F (22 C) to mid 80s F (27 C) Nights - Low 60s F (16 C) to high 60s F (20 C)  June - September Average Daily Temperatures Days - Upper 80s F (27 C) to mid 90s F (32 C) Nights - Upper 60s F (20 C) to mid 70s F (25 C)
<b>Today's weather</b>	28 degrees Centigrade with sun and clouds (18 October 2008)
<b>Best time to visit</b>	Certain periods of the year are busier than others in terms of visitation to Orlando. The December holiday season as well as the traditional spring break vacation period (March and April, especially around Easter weekend) and summer vacation periods acquire the highest visitation numbers. In addition, various conventions and trade shows come to Orlando each year and may limit hotel space. The best travel times are February or September-November.

<b>GETTING THERE</b>	
<b>Flying time</b>	Flight time to Orlando from Toronto is around 2 hours 40 mins

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<b>Airport</b>	For two consecutive years, Orlando International Airport was named by the International Air Transport Association survey as the number one airport in North America and number one in the world for overall passenger satisfaction for airports serving more than 30 million passengers annually.
<b>Distances</b>	Cocoa Beach via the 528 Beeline Expressway is approximately 1 hour from the Orlando attractions area
<b>Trolleys</b>	<b>I-Ride Trolleys</b> are the fun way to get around International Drive. Symbolizing its role as a true destination, the International Drive Resort Area offers its guests a certain amenity with all the bells and whistles: the exclusive, convenient, and economical I-RIDE Trolley Service. Single fare is just .75. Kids under age 12 ride free. Just hop on board an I-RIDE Trolley. Hours 8 a.m. - 10:30 p.m. daily.
<b>Trains</b>	Amtrak serves Orlando with two daily trains originating from New York and Miami with stops in downtown Orlando, Winter Park, Sanford and Kissimmee, as well as with a triweekly train originating from Los Angeles. Amtrak also offers its popular Auto Train, which transports passengers and their vehicles and features the comfort of bi-level Superliner sleepers, a diner and a lounge. The Auto Train runs daily between Lorton, Va., and Sanford, leaving each town at 4 p.m. and arriving at the destination at 8:30 a.m. the next morning.
<b>Car Rental</b>	Car rental is easy at the airport and downtown locations with all major companies represented. Because of the competition for customers, the car rental rates are among the lowest in the world. Those who rent a car while in Orlando will find excellent signage that makes it easy to navigate throughout the area as well as friendly rental agents who will provide detailed maps that will guide you to your destination. Major highway networks provide easy access for visitors to reach their destination and for traveling in and around the Greater Orlando area. Major highways include Interstate 4, the Florida Turnpike, Highway 528 (Bee Line Expressway), Highway 408 (East-West Expressway) and Highway 417 (Central Florida Greenway).
<b>Buses and More</b>	Besides taxi and limousine service to anywhere in the Greater Orlando area, the city's <b>Lynx bus system</b> provides economical public transportation around Orlando. Bus stops are marked with a 'paw' print of a Lynx cat. The downtown Orlando Lymmo bus system provides free transit reaching from the T.D. Waterhouse Centre to City Hall. The 11 Lymmo stations are designated by kiosks and the eight Lymmo stops are indicated by a small sign. Returning to the horse-and-buggy days, carriage rides are also available through local vendors in downtown Orlando.
<b>Passes</b>	The Orlando CVB offers the <b>Orlando Preferred Visitor Magicard</b> , a year-round money-saving discount card that allows visitors to save up to \$500. The card is valid at 105 area establishments including

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	attractions, accommodations, restaurants, dinner theaters, ground transportation, golf courses, shopping malls, eco-tourism and cultural arts. <b>History</b>	<p>During the Second Seminole War, the U.S. Army established an outpost</p>

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	<p>at Fort Gatlin, a few miles south of the modern downtown, in 1838. But it was quickly abandoned when the war came to an end.</p> <p>Prior to being known as its current name, Orlando was known as Jernigan, after the first permanent settler, cattleman Aaron Jernigan, who acquired land along Lake Holden by the terms of the Armed Occupation Act of 1842. But most pioneers did not arrive until after the Third Seminole War in the 1850s. Most of the early residents made their living by cattle ranching.</p> <p>Orlando remained a rural backwater during the American Civil War, and suffered greatly during the Federal Blockade. The Reconstruction Era brought a population explosion, which led to the city's incorporation in 1875.</p> <p>The period from 1875 to 1895 is remembered as Orlando's "Gilded Era," when it became the hub of Florida's citrus industry. But a great freeze in 1894-1895 forced many owners to give up their independent groves, thus consolidating holdings in the hands of a few "citrus barons" which shifted operations south, primarily around Lake Wales in Polk County.</p> <p>Perhaps the most critical event for Orlando's economy occurred in 1965 when Walt Disney announced plans to build Walt Disney World. Although Disney had considered the cities of Miami and Tampa for his park, one of the major reasons behind his decision not to locate in those cities was the threat of hurricanes. The famous vacation resort opened in October 1971, ushering in an explosive population and economic growth for the Orlando metropolitan area, which now encompasses Orange, Seminole, Osceola, and Lake counties. As a result, tourism became the centerpiece of the area's economy and Orlando is consistently ranked as one of the top vacation destinations in the world.</p>

<b>SPORTS ACTIVITIES</b>	Orlando is home to the Orlando Magic, an NBA pro basketball franchise that plays at the TD Waterhouse Centre in downtown Orlando. Sport lovers will enjoy the 176 golf courses, 800 tennis courts and 2,000 lakes for swimming, fishing, boating and water skiing.
<b>Golf</b>	With <b>176 golf courses</b> in the area - many designed by legendary

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	<p>course architects and pro golfers like Jack Nicklaus, Greg Norman, Arnold Palmer, Tom Watson and Robert Trent Jones - those who love the game will have no problem finding a challenging and enjoyable course immersed in Florida's natural beauty. If one of these championship courses proves a little too intimidating, Orlando also offers several miniature golf options.</p>
<b>Fishing</b>	<p>Anglers recognize the Greater Orlando area's 300 named lakes, rivers and springs as some of the best freshwater fishing in the world, particularly for largemouth bass. Those who prefer saltwater fishing can cast their lines from piers, from the shore or from deep-sea fishing boats in the East Coast waters within an hour's drive, or in the West Coast waters, only two hours away. Several fish camps and guides are available to help visitors navigate the local waters.</p>
<b>Adventure Activities</b>	<p>Orlando's Unique Extreme Adventures: Orlando is a virtual endless summer of outdoor fun - in the water, on land or in the air. With more than 2,000 lakes, springs and rivers, Orlando offers unlimited boating, canoeing, tubing, jet-skiing and water-skiing opportunities. Numerous ecotours offer an insider's look at natural Florida, from cruises through the headwaters of the Everglades to bird- and gator-spotting excursions. For more adrenaline-pumping activities, visitors can get behind the wheel of a 600-horse-power Nextel Cup race car at the Richard Petty Driving Experience, skydive indoors at SkyVenture Orlando, enjoy a breathtaking sunrise hot air balloon ride, or hang glide at Wallaby Ranch Hang Gliding Flight Park, the first year-round hang gliding flight park in the world. <b>ATTRACTIONS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Arboretum of the University of Central Florida</b></li> <li>• <b>Blue Spring State Park</b>, which is the winter home of large numbers of Florida manatees that come upstream from the St. Johns River to bask in the warm 72 °F (22 °C) waters of the springs. Canoeing, swimming and fishing are popular activities at Blue Springs.</li> <li>• <b>Central Florida Zoological Park</b>, located in Sanford on Lake Monroe. This 100 acre (400,000 m<sup>2</sup>) zoo is home to a butterfly garden, herpetarium, and numerous tropical animals. The zoo originally started as a collection in the Sanford Fire Department, but grew into a regional zoo in 1975. It is currently in the planning stages of expansion and renaming the facility to "Zoo Orlando at Sanford".</li> <li>• <b>Church Street Station</b>, a multi-level shopping mall and entertainment center that once featured an abundance of specialty shops, restaurants, nightclubs, and bars. Purchased in the late 1990s by TransContinental Talent owner Lou Pearlman, it is now virtually defunct, as the area suffered in post-9/11 tourist-industry slump. The area is being redeveloped with residential condominiums.</li> <li>• <b>Cirque du Soleil:</b> La Nouba, in Downtown Disney West Side, features its renowned blend of acrobatics and special effects with more than 70 artists from around the globe performing in a custom-designed, 1,671-seat theater.</li> <li>• <b>Cornell Fine Arts Museum</b>, situated on the campus of Rollins College, features significant loans, recent acquisitions, and items from the Cornell's renowned permanent collection. Admission is free.</li> <li>• <b>Discovery Cove</b>, a resort that is part of the SeaWorld Adventure Park complex. Some attraction features are tropical fish in a coral reef, snorkeling with stingrays, and interacting with birds in an aviary, as well</li> </ul>
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as swimming and playing with dolphins during a half-hour session.

- **Gatorland** houses thousands of alligators and crocodiles. A few of Gatorland's residents have made wrangling appearances in movies, television shows and commercial spots. The 54 year old park combines a petting zoo, bird sanctuary, mini-water park, eco-tour and outdoor entertainment, including daily alligator wrestling.
- **Hard Rock Café** is the Orlando location of the famed restaurant chain with the typical HRC music memorabilia. There is also Hard Rock Live, a 3,000-capacity live music venue, and the Hard Rock Hotel, a resort hotel with a California-style restaurant called "The Kitchen". It is one of eight worldwide, and one of three in Florida. (Miami and Tampa are the other two.)
- **International Trolley and Train Museum** features 14 model railroad trains with sound and lighting traveling through an indoor garden with 12 foot (4 m) high mountains, waterfalls, and more than 30 trestles and tunnels. Also on display are toy trains from the 1920s to the present. Visitors can catch a ride in a California Victorian-style half open/half closed trolley or the 5/8 replica of an 1880 locomotive (a Mason Bogey) with its passenger cars.
- **Kennedy Space Center** is 45 minutes from Orlando and south of Daytona Beach. Visitors can tour launch areas, see giant rockets, "train" in spaceflight simulators, and much more. Kennedy Space Center Visitor Complex is open every day except Christmas Day and certain launch days. Apart from the Astronaut Hall of Fame, Space Center bus tours run every 15 minutes with stops at an observation gantry and the Apollo / Saturn V Center. Other guided tours include NASA Up Close, Cape Canaveral: Then and Now, and Lunch With An Astronaut. Combo tickets offer maximum access admission, plus one guided tour.
- **The Kerouac House**, in the College Park neighborhood of Orlando, is where writer Jack Kerouac lived during the time his novel *On the Road* was published and released, making him a national sensation and Beat Generation icon. He lived in the house with his mother Gabrielle from July 1957 to the spring of 1958, and wrote his three-act play, *The Beat Generation*, a 51-chorus poem called *Orlanda Blues*, and the novel *The Dharma Bums* during his time there. In 1997, the Kerouac Project of Orlando formed, and restored the Kerouac house. It is now a haven for aspiring writers who can live in the house as they create their own work.
- **The World's Largest McDonald's PlayPlace**, located on the corner of Sand Lake Road and International Drive, looks like a fry box from the exterior. The interior features an arcade with 60+ games with prize redemption, a 1950s room, a waterfall and a gift shop. The *Bistro Gourmet* at McDonald's features chef-prepared food, such as panini

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and deli sandwiches, pasta, soup, desserts, and hand-dipped ice cream, plus the standard McDonald's menu.

- **The Morse Museum of American Art**, located at Rollins College, houses a permanent Tiffany & Co. exhibit featuring the world's "most comprehensive" collection of the works of Louis Comfort Tiffany. It includes Tiffany art glass, jewelry, pottery, and the chapel interior designed for the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago. There is also an exhibit on the Tiffany home, and American paintings from the 19th century. The museum was founded in 1942.
- **Old Town**, in Kissimmee, features eight restaurants, fifteen amusement park rides and 75 shops along its brick-lined streets. Classic car shows every Friday and Saturday feature hundreds of vintage automobiles. Admission and parking are free.
- **The Orange County Regional History Center** Features exhibits and artifacts from the earliest days of the region to the modern day. Includes information on everything from the time of the Seminole Indians to the founding of the city to the Civil Rights era to the Disney period to today.
- **The Orlando Museum of Art**, which has ongoing exhibitions of American portraits and landscapes, American impressionist works, and art of the ancient Americas.
- **The Orlando Science Center**, is a 207,000 square foot (19,000 m<sup>2</sup>) hands-on learning center with hundreds of interactive exhibits for visitors of all ages. Images surround visitors on the giant screen of the Dr. Phillips CineDome. Other attractions include the Body Zone, teaching health and fitness, as well as an observatory. The center has the largest refracting telescope in Florida.
- **The Ripley's Believe It or Not!** Orlando Odditorium is located in a building artfully constructed to appear as if it were collapsing to one side, which may be a sly reference to central Florida's infamous sinkholes. Visitors can explore bizarre artifacts, strange collections, weird art/hobbies and interactive exhibits in sixteen odd galleries. It is one of 27 Ripley museums in ten countries.
- **Wonder Works** A funhouse located on International Drive. Can be easily identified as an upside down white building.
- **Wekiwa Springs State Park**, which comprises around 7,000 acres (28.3 km<sup>2</sup>) of wild Florida. The springs pump out 42 million gallons of crystal clear water a day. Popular activities at the park include canoeing, swimming, picnicking and fishing.
- **World of Orchids**, featuring thousands of blooms in an enclosed tropical rainforest. World of Orchids is a working greenhouse shipping orchids and other plants nationwide. A greenhouse covers nearly an acre (4,000 m<sup>2</sup>), and in this controlled climate of warm, humid air some 1,000 orchids are displayed in a natural jungle setting, with streams,

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	<p>waterfalls, and squawking parrots. World of Orchids also has a 1,000 foot (300 m) long boardwalk meandering off into nearby wetlands. <b>Beaches</b>	St Petersburg/Clearwater on the Gulf Coast is known as Orlando's Beach and is a two hour drive away. Here you will find some of the finest beaches anywhere in the US and they have been consistently rated as the best in the US
<b>Wildlife</b>	Manatees, alligators, Disney's Animal Kingdom
<b>Parks</b>	Cypress Gardens Adventure Park, an amusement park opened in 1936. This park features beautiful botanical gardens, 40 rides, 5 roller coasters and a water park. But it is most famous for its lovely southern belles and world-renowned Ski Shows.
<b>Gardens</b>	Harry P. Leu Gardens, which is an inner city oasis covering 50 acres (20,000 m <sup>2</sup> ) and features colorful annuals, palms, an orchid house, a floral clock and a butterfly garden.

<b>Casinos</b>	A <b>Sterling Casino Cruise</b> aboard the world's largest gaming ship is a sure bet for fun-twice daily free cruises depart from nearby Cape Canaveral. Those without their sea legs can make a two-hour drive to the Seminole Hard Rock Casino in Tampa.
