THE RIDEAU HERITAGE ROUTE AND THE 1000 ISLANDS	The Rideau Heritage Route from Lake Ontario in Kingston to the Ottawa River, the Rideau Canal links historic sites, charming villages, quaint attractions and spectacular recreation areas. And the Thousand Islands Region blends the waters of the St. Lawrence and Lake Ontario from Kingston to Cornwall. This beautiful area is designated a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve as it represents Eastern Canada's most bio diverse ecosystem.
	Explore the theatre, arts, culture, history, fine cuisine, outdoor adventures - and get out on the water in this glorious region of South Eastern Ontario. The Rideau Heritage Route and The 1000 Islands are united by their magnificent access to water and water based activities such as sightseeing cruises, paddling, fishing and scuba diving.
	Rideau Heritage Route
	Nowadays you can pedal, paddle, cruise or drive through Ontario's history along the Rideau Heritage Route – it's a feast for history buffs and a paradise for cyclists and kayakers. Boating enthusiasts will find the Rideau Canal well marked with buoys and easy and fun to navigate. And a Houseboat gives a different twist and is a leisurely way to explore at your own pace.
	Anchored by Ottawa's Rideau Canal – a UNESCO World Heritage Site – you can travel back in time through the heritage villages, historic locks and thriving shops along the Rideau Canal and Big Rideau Lakes. See the Parks Canada locks in operation at 27 lock stations in the heart of Leeds and Grenville County. Stroll by Merrickville's heritage buildings and hit the thriving shops in Westport and Newboro.
	A "must do" is to cruise the canal. There are four unique tours to choose from :
	- Take a narrated tour on The Blue Goose, a 12-passenger Gozzard Classic 24-foot covered tour boat. The 2.5-hour tour leaves from the Tay Basin in Perth and makes its way along the 10-kilometre canal to Lower Rideau Lake at Beveridge Locks, through beautiful and pristine wildlife viewing areas.

The Rideau Canal opened in 1832 and is the oldest continuously operated canal system in North America. From present day Ottawa it travels south along the Rideau River and through a series of small lakes to the Cataraqui River which empties into Lake Ontario at Kingston.
The plan to construct The Rideau Canal between Lake Ontario and the Ottawa River was conceived after the War of 1812. It was designed to provide a secure supply route from Montréal to Kingston, avoiding the vulnerable St. Lawrence River route. The War of 1812 left its mark on the region and now is being celebrated by many events marking the centenary of the conflict.
The canal was an amazing achievement and owes much to the determination and engineering prowess of its creator, Colonel By. For most of its length of 202 km, the new canal passed through an unsettled wilderness where Colonel By and his workers managed to create forty-seven locks, some of them posing a considerable engineering challenge. Because of its military role, the canal also included defences in the form of fortified lock masters' houses and substantial blockhouses at the lock stations most exposed to possible enemy attack.
1000 Islands
The endless shorelines and majestic waterways of the Thousand Islands are dotted with a thousand waterfront villages, sailboats and century-old lighthouses. This area is a Mecca for summer visitors and was a playground of the "Rich and Famous" at the turn of the century. Take a relaxing scenic boat cruise to see the many summer homes, big and small, perched on the islands in the St Lawrence - including famous Boldt Castle, built by George C. Boldt, the millionaire proprietor of the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York City.
Native peoples called The Thousand Islands the "Garden of the Great Spirit." Gananoque and the 1000 Islands have deep connections and historical significant to many Aboriginal Nations in Eastern Ontario and the U.S. The Frontenac Arch Biosphere was well known to aboriginals as a rich hunting area and a gathering spot on route to the cranberry fields of the Rideau and the wild rice fields close to Peterborough. The Islands are full of Native names as well as artifacts and were bought from the Mississauga Obiway people in the late 1700's as part of the Crawford Purchase. Currently Gananoque and the Islands are referred



	<ul> <li>to as being Mohawk Territory as part of the land was gifted to Joseph Brant (Thyendinga) after the American War of Independence.</li> <li>Take to the water in a Kayak or, with crystal clear waters and an abundance of shipwrecks, the Thousand Islands represent some of the best fresh water scuba diving in the world. Kids	This summer, get the kids away from the video games and computer screens and let their imaginations run wild. Your family can explore trees and forests firsthand by taking advantage of one of the many Great Waterway camping experiences. <b>Bon Echo Provincial Park</b> offers a chance for kids to encounter Native pictographs carved in a majestic rock face. Campfire stories at Bon Echo are ignited by the tales of the Ojibwa trickster Nanabush, the unofficial mascot of the park. If staying in a tent is not your style, you may want to live pioneer style at <b>Upper Canada Village</b> in Morrisburg. Booking a stay at Montgomery House, a cozy historic log building at the outskirts of the village, offers your family a chance to explore 1800s pioneer life by day and then enjoy modern-day accommodations at night. At Upper Canada Village, costumed interpreters demonstrate how the work of the day consumed pioneer life. Horse-drawn wagons and a barge are on site to take visitors through the village. Whether you arrive by boat or by land, a stop along the historic <b>Rideau Canal</b> reveals picturesque scenery and engineering marvels. At Jones Falls lockstation beginning in 1827, Colonel John By and his workers oversaw construction of the great stone arch dam, one of the most impressive engineering works on the canal system. A working blacksmith shop and the restored lockmaster's house are open to visitors and staffed by Parks Canada interpreters.



Legends from the wild frontiers of the canal building days include a story about a barrel of silver that fell overboard when a voyageur canoe was rolled by huge waves. Stories are told about silver coins being buried by crooked paymasters trying to skim some money from the workers' pay. If you don't manage to find the lost coins you can go further along the Rideau Heritage route. The <b>Rideau Canal Museum</b> located in Smiths Falls, Ontario and is housed in a 19th century stone building which was once a mill: the Woods Mills Complex. Inside, high-technology displays and a variety of artifacts bring to life the history of the canal - its construction from 1826 to 1831, its role throughout history, as well as the distinct lifestyle and folklore associated with the Rideau Waterway. Explore the unique "Tunnel of History". Take a short climb to the "Lookout" to see a panoramic view of the canal and the Town of Smiths Falls. Test your skills as a "Canal Captain" in a steerable model boat. Sit back in the museum's auditorium to view a short presentation. Open May to Oct: <u>http://www.rideau-info.com/museum</u>
A boat ride in The Great Waterway can lead families to one of the beautiful Rideau Canal locks or to a real-life castle. 1000 Islands boat cruises leaving from Gananoque, Rockport and Ivy Lea take passengers to Boldt Castle. Built at the turn of the century the castle is a millionaire's show of love for his wife. A tour of the castle takes visitors back in time and displays in the castle depict life at the turn of the century in the 1000 Islands. You can dock for free or take a Rockport Boat Lines tour to arrive at Dark Island and Singer Castle. <b>Singer Castle</b> , built the same time as Boldt Castle, has a dungeon, tunnels, a gilded clock tower, secret passages and hidden places for spying. Built by the president of Singer Sewing Machine Company, it is inspired by the hunting lodge described in Sir Walter Scott's novel Woodstock. With the magnificent grounds and castle as a backdrop, children can imagine that they are a queen or king, at least for the day.
<b>Kingston 1000 Island Cruises</b> : Step on board the magnificent 1000 Islands - a "must" on a visit to eastern Ontario. This classic river boat offers the widest variety of cruises in the 1000 Islands region. Join one of the scheduled departures or customize a memorable cruise event to your particular needs. See the historic harbour of Kingston, Canada's first capital with a 90 minute tour of the Kingston waterfront and surrounding islands. UNIQUES	
Surprising	The Locks on the Rideau Canal: The locks on the Rideau operate today much as they did 160 years ago. The large wooden lock doors are opened and closed using hand cranks. Hand cranks are also used to let water in and out of the locks. Most of the stone blocks that you see are the ones originally emplaced in the 19th century. The locks cater to tourists and even the novice boater will have no trouble locking through. Parks Canada staff are always there to assist. All the locks offer nice grassy lawns with picnic tables. Lock watching is an interesting pastime,



	a great way to spend a lazy afternoon, watching boats of all descriptions go up and down in the lock. Many transient boaters moor at the locks which offer good dockage, washroom facilities and an interesting area to explore. Several of the locks have defensible lockmaster houses and blockhouses which are open for public viewing. Many of the locks offer hiking trails. Several of the locks such as those at Ottawa, Merrickville, Smiths Falls, Chaffey's, Jones Falls, and Kingston have heritage museums located close by.
History	The history of Canada runs through the rivers, lakes and canals of The Great Waterway region in Eastern Ontario. For thousands of years, aboriginals used the waters to access seasonal hunting and fishing camps. It was along the St. Lawrence River and Lake Ontario in 1615 that French explorer <b>Samuel de Champlain</b> was introduced to native culture in the region. The French would ally with the Algonquins and Hurons while the British would take sides with the Iroquois, touching off decades of bitter fighting. Following the American Revolution of 1776, the newly formed United States was not a friendly place for those who supported the British Crown. Thousands of outcasts, who became known as the <b>United Empire Loyalists</b> , made their way north to the regions that would become known as Ontario and Quebec. All the major towns and cities along the St. Lawrence were Loyalist settlements. Loyalist Parkway The 100-kilometre <b>Loyalist Parkway</b> runs from Trenton to Kingston. Officially opened by Queen Elizabeth in 1984, it features a bicycle path that takes visitors past remarkable 18th and 19th century period architecture once inhabited by Loyalist families – 125 notable heritage buildings in all, documented in a brochure available at regional tourism offices. Plaques point visitors to such outstanding sites. War of 1812 It's the <b>200th anniversary of the War of 1812-1814 between Britain and the United States.</b> Yes, we all know about the Americans burning York (Toronto) in 1813, then the Canadians torching Washington in retaliation in 1814. The St. Lawrence corridor and Lake Ontario, however, were the real front lines of the war. On the Loyalist Parkway is a plaque recounting the escape of the 20-gun sloop Royal George, attacked by seven American ships in 1812, yet managing to escape to the safety of Kingston Harbour, its home base, where the shore batteries provided protection. It was during this time that Fort Wellington was built at Prescott, a Loyalist settlement, to fend off the Americans just across the St. Lawrence.



capital, Ottawa, came along. In June of 1841, with the combining of Lower Canada (Quebec) and Upper Canada (Ontario), Kingston was proclaimed the fledgling union's first capital. A hospital, built on what would become the campus of Queen's University, became the first Parliament building of Canada, serving in that capacity until 1844. Kingstonians now celebrate First Canada Day every June 15 with specially brewed beers and other libations in and around historic Market Square. Kingstonians later tried to entice parliament into its stately city hall building.
<b>Sir John A. Macdonald</b> Kingston was also home to Canada's first Prime Minister, Sir John A. Macdonald. Macdonald's home, Bellevue House, is fully restored, furnished and run by Parks Canada as a museum. You can also take a self-guided walking tour of the city, In Sir John A.'s Footsteps, by following a printed guide available at City Hall, listening to a pre-loaded MP3 player, or by downloading the tour onto your own player. Featured narrators include hockey icon Don Cherry and former prime minister
Jean Chretien. Outstanding historic sites to visit in The Great Waterway district: <b>Fort Henry</b> : This imposing fort overlooking Kingston also dates back to the War of 1812. The British began construction on today's version in 1832 to protect the Lake Ontario entrance to the Rideau Canal at Kingston as well as the naval dockyard. The Fort Henry Guard patrol the fort's massive inner sanctum with mascot goat David. As part of the daily activities, children dress up in guard uniforms and learn how to march like a 19th-century British soldier. Cannon blasts end each day's operations. The Wednesday night Sunset Ceremonies, with precision
battle drills by the Guard, are not to be missed. <b>Rideau Canal:</b> The 202-kilometre system built between 1826 and 1832 was designed as an alternative route to the St. Lawrence River to avoid contact with hostile American forces. The system begins at the Kingston Mills lockstation and extends north to Ottawa. Most lock gates are still hand-cranked by Parks Canada staff to pass boats along the system. All are located in picturesque settings with plaques and signage for interpretation. Jones Falls, a 35-minute drive north of Kingston, features an operating blacksmith shop and furnished lockmaster's house with costumed interpreters.
Fort Wellington: Located at Prescott, the fort has been beautifully restored by Parks Canada based on the 1846 design when the fear of an American attack loomed yet again. It is surrounded by a 3-metre-high palisade and an interior blockhouse, a fort within a fort, constructed with metre-thick stone walls. No matter where you vacation in The Great Waterway – from the wine region of Prince Edward County, to the heritage villages along the Rideau or in one of the full-service cities on the St. Lawrence or Lake Ontario, there is likely a welcoming golf course within 10 minutes of where you're staying. Many new courses have sprung up in the past 10 years to complement the established golf and country clubs that happily provide tee times to travelling duffers. <b>The Cornwall Golf and Country Club</b> , founded in 1896, is one of the oldest courses in North America. within an historic shell. A few years ago, construction crews pulled the plaster off the walls exposing original limestone walls circa 1879 – the early days of Confederation when Sir John A. Macdonald strolled the streets of the city, perhaps taking in a show at what was then known as Martin's Opera House. Today, the main auditorium has been updated with acoustical equipment sporting all the current day bells and whistles.
There's a long, luscious history at <b>The Empire Theatre</b> in Belleville. In 1938 it opened its doors as The McCarthy Theatre, a popular venue for feature films and live performance. The 1960s were a rough time for the theatre; it sat closed for a dozen years until a local entrepreneur purchased the building with a dream of transforming the space into a state of the art theatre. In 2003, the spiffed up and wired-in 700-seat Empire Theatre and Centre for the Performing Arts opened its doors. The new performance space hosts top name acts like Bachman & Turner and Serena Ryder, as well as stage productions like The Wizard of Oz and Stuart McLean's Vinyl Café.
Arriving at the theatre by boat well, that is a bit unusual. Gananoque's very popular <b>Thousand Islands Playhouse</b> draws guests (they come on foot, by car, bus tour and by boat) for music and theatre performances in two renovated historic venues right on the banks of the St. Lawrence River. Thirty years ago, the community undertook an extensive renovation to create a theatre space in what had been the local canoe club. Hailed as the most active theatre in Eastern Ontario, the Thousand Islands Playhouse has consistently been named one of the top five summer festivals in Ontario. In Morrisburg, the Upper Canada Playhouse can honestly claim its performance roots come from "under the big tent." The theatre troupe had its beginnings in a giant tent before converting a former toothbrush factory into its current home, a totally equipped, fully accessible, intimate theatre space seating 265. The main draw is the summer season of comedies, but the theatre also offers a Christmas play, and shows in the spring and the fall.

	Boldt Castle George and Louise Boldt were two of such wealthy magnates drawn to the 1000 Islands. At the turn of the century Boldt commissioned the building of a majestic and ornately-designed, 120 room replica of a German Castle on "heart Island", along with a drawbridge, powerhouse, tunnels, a children's playhouse, Italian gardens and a stone arch resembling Arc de Triumph in Paris. It was to be a gift to his beloved wife, however Louise died unexpectedly and the Castle was left for ruin. Today, the castle stands refurbished and restored, a monument to one man's love for his wife, and one of our remaining examples of what life in the 1000 Islands was like during the Gilded Age. Upper Canada Village	Upper Canada Village is a sister attraction to Fort Henry, downriver on the St Lawrence. It is a recreated 1860s riverside community on approximately 70 acres. The Village includes over 40 heritage buildings, many recovered from the area prior to the Seaway flooding in 1958. Costumed historical interpreters and artisans engage over 150,000 visitors and students each year with the sights and sounds of 1860s village life and social activities, featuring talks and demonstrations at the tinsmith's, broom-maker's, at the farms, in the printing office, at the cheese factory, woolen factory, sawmill, flour mill and bakery. Horse-drawn boat and wagon rides add to visitors' enjoyment. Fresh-baked bread, cheddar cheese and other goods produced by Village artisans are available for purchase in the Village Store. The Village has the highest Michelin Green (Travel) Guide rating – 3-stars recognizing the site as "highly recommended" and designated one of only a few "Principal Sites" to visit in Canada. www.uppercanadavillage.com
Castles/Forts	<b>Fort Henry,</b> erected in 1812 and largely unchanged since its reconstruction in the 1830s, commands a high promontory overlooking the harbour and town. Mid May to end August, the Fort Henry Guard and their goat mascot, David, perform 19th-century drills, musters, and parades. Regular programming includes music and marching displays by the fife-and-drum band, exhibitions of infantry drill, and mock battles of tall ships, many of them brought to a close with the firing of the garrison artillery and the lowering of the Union Jack. Parts of the fort - the officers' quarters, men's barracks, kitchens, and artisans' shops - have been restored to show the military way of life as it was around the year 1867. The most imposing events are the "Sunset Ceremonies," elaborate military tattoos with martial music performed Wednesdays at 7:30pm in July and August. On those nights, an extra treat is a three-course dinner served in the officers' dining room followed by



seating in bleachers or in the balcony to view the sunset ceremonies.
Martello Towers: Built in response to the1846 Oregon Crisis with US,
these are 6 round towers, two of them open: Murney and Fort Frederick,
which have canons on rotating tracks.

OTHER ACTIVITIES	
Shopping	No trip to the lake-splattered region north of Kingston is complete without a shopping excursion to <b>Trousdale's General Store</b> in the village of Sydenham. In its heyday during the 1800s, the village streets were lined with mills, breweries, hotels and taverns. Today, the limestone heritage buildings have been renovated into cafes, specialty shops and bakeries. At the heart of the village is Trousdale's General Store, a thriving shop that has been in the same family for five generations. Trousdale's has all the modern wares (from martini glasses to funky garden art) as well as a handpicked selection of candles, soaps and kitchen gadgets, all surrounded by the original creaky wooden floors and tin ceilings. Now part time capsule and part shopping experience, the wares are interspersed with some of the original fixtures and displays of antiques and memorabilia. The famous Rideau Canal is the thread that joins small villages along its winding route linking the cities of Kingston and Ottawa – places like Merrickville, Chaffey's Mills and Westport were originally mill towns built by the stonemasons who created the canal. In the fall and winter months, the villages along the Rideau positively sparkle – unique products, attentive service and small town atmosphere are an unbeatable combination. When it comes to retail therapy along the Rideau, small is definitely big! Once a sleepy little village, nestled at the midway point of the Rideau Canal, <b>Westport</b> has developed a niche as a magnet for atmosphere-thirsty shoppers. On the banks of Upper Rideau Lake, the village has it all: the perfect countryside setting and just the right number of small back streets, liberally sprinkled with unique shops, antique haunts, bakeries, restaurants and tea rooms. When the air turns crisp, it's time for the <b>Fall Colours Studio Tour</b> , usually held on the Thanksgiving weekend. Artisans, photographers, rug makers and potters open their studio doors to show off a wide range of original works – from primitive carvings to funky clothing a



	Leather (handbags, backpacks, briefcases and travel bags in colours and quality second to none) and Village Metalsmiths, which lays claim to being Canada's oldest foundry, dating back to 1840. The ironworks is renowned for its colourful, period, heritage-style signs, weather vanes and mailboxes.
