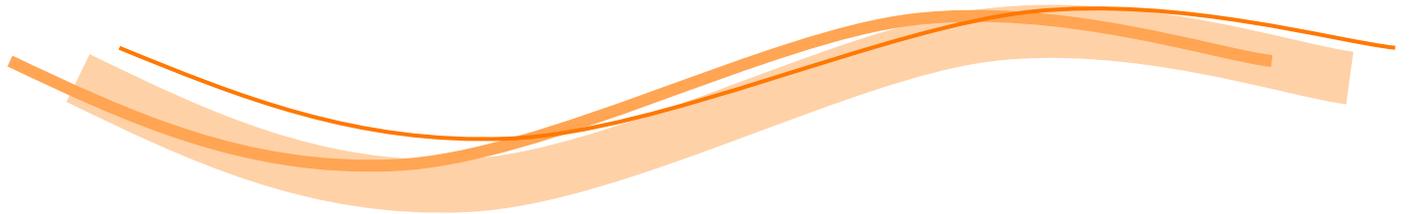

<p>ROUTES</p>	<p>There are four spectacular routes:</p> <p>First Passage to the West: Vancouver: Vancouver, Kamloops, Calgary</p> <p>Retrace the steps of 19th century explorers, travel through the legendary Spiral Tunnels and pass by the spot where the last spike on the Canadian Pacific Railway was driven. This is the only passenger rail service on this historic route, and its construction united Canada from east to west. You'll also cross the Continental Divide.</p> <p>Journey through the Clouds: Vancouver, Kamloops, Jasper</p> <p>Travel through scenic valleys, the Coastal Mountain Range and the Fraser Canyon with its spectacular white water and dramatic landscape. You will follow the route of the Fraser River, home of British Columbia's largest salmon fishing run, pass by the Albrede Glacier and magnificent Pyramid Falls, and hopefully see wildlife. The highlight of this route is majestic Mount Robson, the highest peak in the Canadian Rockies.</p> <p>Rainforest to Gold Rush: Whistler, Quesnel, Jasper</p> <p>Travel past stunning lakes, through the tranquil coastal rainforest and the desert-like conditions of the Fraser Canyon into the vast ranchlands of the Cariboo Plateau. This is gold country where prospectors came to find their fortunes in the late 1850s and early 1860s. Visit the Gold Pan City of Quesnel, journey through the Rocky Mountain Trench, be awestruck by spectacular Mount Robson, and cap off the journey in the largest national park in the Canadian Rockies.</p> <p>Whistler Sea to Sky Climb: Vancouver, Whistler</p> <p>Enjoy the breathtaking scenery between Vancouver and Whistler, hosts of the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games. During your three and a half hour train trip you'll journey from Vancouver, through scenic Howe Sound and the Cheakamus Canyon, across a trestle bridge, past the jagged snow-capped peaks of the Tantalus Mountains and by an extinct volcano, before finally arriving in the mountain landscape of Whistler Village.</p>

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WHISTLER SEA TO SKY CLIMB

This trip provides guests with an exclusive look at some of the most spectacular views in British Columbia. Following the famous Sea to Sky corridor, this three-hour train experience is a link between two world-class destinations, showcasing Vancouver to Whistler, British Columbia. Not only will guests experience a relaxing and comfortable ride, they will also be privy to such scenic delights as cascading waterfalls, old-growth forests, snow-capped mountain peaks and brilliant Pacific waters from a unique train perspective

The journey begins in North Vancouver, B.C., and travel 118 km through Howe Sound, Squamish and the Cheakamus Canyon. Guests end their experience in the four-season resort town of Whistler, B.C., which in partnership with Vancouver, hosted the 2010 Winter Olympic Games. It operates twice daily from May 1 through to October 16. Departing from North Vancouver at 8:30 a.m., the train will travel northbound and arrive in Whistler by approximately 11:30 am, giving guests plenty of time to spend the day exploring Whistler Village and all that the area has to offer. Southbound departures are scheduled to leave Whistler at 3:00 pm and arrive in Vancouver at 6:00 pm. Guests can opt to take the train in one direction or as a return trip on any day they choose.

Travelling northbound, you begin your journey by passing under the Lion's Gate Bridge. Views of downtown Vancouver and Stanley Park can be seen as the train hugs the scenic waterfront of West Vancouver's most exclusive residential neighbourhoods. With a quick ride through Horseshoe Bay, the eastern shores of Howe Sound come into view. Stunning scenery of the Coast Mountains rise steeply to the right and the sparkling Pacific Ocean flows to the left. Nearing the town of Squamish, the impressive cascade of Shannon Falls and the spectacular dome peak of Mount Garibaldi, rising 2,678 metres (8787 feet) are in full sight. Around the bend, you climb a steep grade through Cheakamus Canyon, where the river below tumbles through a craggy gorge. Another highlight en-route is Brandywine Falls, which can be seen before the train reaches its destination of Whistler B.C., a year-round resort town renowned for skiing and outdoor activities.

Glacier Dome

An adventure in true comfort with panoramic scenery, exemplary service, in a refined yet relaxed atmosphere. The custom-built single-level glass dome coaches will give each guest a front row seat to the endless array of spectacular views. Those travelling northbound to Whistler will be served breakfast at their seats while on the southbound departure to North Vancouver, a classic afternoon tea will be offered. In each 68 seat Glacier Dome coach, two friendly Onboard Attendants will provide a detailed commentary of the region.

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	<p>Coast Classic Large picture windows, assigned seating and extended legroom in a traditional 1950's remodelled rail coach environment are just some of features offered onboard Coast Classic. One of the highlights of this train trip is the individual attention and colourful, interpretive commentary provided by a dedicated Onboard Attendant. A light meal and beverage service will be provided on both northbound and southbound departures.</p>
<p>RAINFOREST TO GOLD RUSH</p>	<p>In 2006, Rocky Mountaineer Vacations introduced a third route for the acclaimed <i>Rocky Mountaineer</i> train in Western Canada, the Rainforest to Gold Rush. Carrying guests through the diverse beauty of British Columbia's interior, this journey offers adventure, discovery and Rocky Mountaineer's renowned level of legendary service, experience and scenery. The two-day, all daylight rail journey begins in Whistler, B.C. and travels through towering canyons, lush ranchlands and snow-capped mountain peaks to the quaint town of Jasper, Alberta in the Canadian Rockies.</p> <p>The Rocky Mountaineer travels 1034 km along the new Rainforest to Gold Rush Route in both eastbound and westbound directions, opening up the seldom seen interior of B.C. to travellers from around the world. It departs in the morning from the four-season resort town of Whistler, British Columbia, weaves through the Cariboo and Chilcotin regions, and reaches its destination of Jasper, Alberta, with an overnight stop at the end of day one in Quesnel B.C. The Rocky Mountaineer Fraser Discovery Route links with the Whistler Mountaineer train operating between North Vancouver and Whistler.</p> <p>The Rocky Mountaineer Rainforest to Gold Rush Route is a two-day trip departing on selected Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays between May 2 and October 14. To complement the rail service, package tours have been introduced to provide travelers with the option of fully exploring all that the region has to offer.</p> <p>As the Rocky Mountaineer travels in the eastbound direction and leaves the resort town of Whistler, B.C., it passes through river canyons and the lush farmland of the Pemberton Valley. Following the shores of Anderson and Seton Lakes, the train hugs the water's edge and on clear days the reflection of the picturesque mountain scenery seems close enough to touch. As the train reaches the highest point of the day's journey, guests enjoy the vistas of the Cariboo Plateau, with its rolling hills, endless forests and vast cattle ranches. The journey continues eastward to the mighty Canadian Rockies and dramatic mountain scenery. Entering the Rocky Mountain Trench and the upper reaches of the Fraser River, guests are surrounded by the Rocky Mountains rising steeply to the north and the Cariboo Mountains to the south. The route</p>

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	<p>then leaves the Fraser River at Tete Jaune Cache, and climbs past Mount Robson, the highest peak in the Canadian Rockies at 3,954 metres (12,972 feet), to the top of the Yellowhead Pass and the border to the province of Alberta. The journey ends as the Rocky Mountaineer descends through Jasper National Park to the resort town of Jasper.</p>
<p>GOLDLEAF DINING</p>	<p>Onboard Rocky Mountaineer’s GoldLeaf Service, guests travel through the breathtaking scenery of British Columbia and the Canadian Rockies, surrounded by comfort and elegance. The bi-level, glass-domed coach, offers panoramic views from the upper level and an intimate dining room with crisp white linens, gleaming silverware and fresh cut flowers on the main level. Travellers are treated to outstanding three course, à la carte meals, made with the finest and freshest ingredients indigenous to two of Canada’s most bountiful regions, British Columbia and Alberta. Menu selections of Prime Alberta Beef, wild Salmon from the Pacific Ocean and regional local game, accompanied by a selection of award winning BC wines from the Okanagan Valley, will delight even the most discerning palate.</p> <p>With an accomplished ‘dream team’ of four world renowned chefs, dining onboard the Rocky Mountaineer is truly an experience like no other. The talented chefs, Frédéric Couton, Joseph Lassaga, Jean Pierre Guerin and Raoul Prigent, offer an international flair from kitchens in Geneva, Spain and France. Their diverse backgrounds and expertise showcase innovative menu creations that celebrate the distinctive character of Western Canada and provide a decadent culinary experience onboard.</p> <p>To accommodate more than 100,000 international guests who travel onboard the Rocky Mountaineer every year, a culinary team of 85 employees, including eight Sous Chefs and two Executive Sous Chefs, have perfected the art of cooking onboard a moving train. BEST TIME TO TRAVEL	<p>Onboard the Rocky Mountaineer, every season offers unique advantages. For instance, June is 'Springtime in the Rockies' with snow on the mountaintops and flowers beginning to bloom. April, May and October offer tremendous savings.</p>
WEATHER AND WHAT TO PACK	<p>Temperatures vary significantly depending on location, time of day, and season, from a low of 10°C to a high of 30° C. Kamloops and Quesnel, in particular, may be very warm in the summer. Plan to bring a sweater, slacks, and a light topcoat or raincoat, as well as lightweight summer wear. Pack sturdy comfortable shoes, especially if you plan to walk in the</p>

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	mountains. Flat-soled shoes should be worn on the train. Comfortable, casual attire is welcomed on the Rocky Mountaineer and many of our guests carry their sunglasses with them onboard the train. In spring and fall, include a light coat or warm jacket if you're traveling to high altitudes.
WHEELCHAIR ACCESSIBILITY	Rocky Mountaineer has excellent wheelchair facilities. There are areas where a wheelchair can be secured in place and have very easy access to the wheelchair accessible washrooms. Wheelchair lifters are available at all stations and the GoldLeaf dome coaches are equipped with interior ADA-style elevators. They should be informed at the time of booking of the extent of the disability so they can guarantee that all plans are in place to ensure the vacation experience is a pleasant one.

CANADIAN RAILWAY HISTORY	1867 Confederation; 1871 BC joined Confederation on promise of railway link; 1880 Canadian Pacific formed; 1881 Major Rogers found pass through Selkirk Mtns – Rogers Pass; 1882 Van Horne hired as GM: 500 miles of track per year; 1885 last spike at Craigellachie Nov 7th – completed in 54 months, 6years ahead of schedule "If we can't export the scenery, we'll import the tourists" – William Van Horne, CP President

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WILDLIFE	<p>There are wonderful opportunities for viewing wildlife from the train and during your stay in the Canadian Rockies including bear, elk, deer, moose, bald eagles, osprey, salmon, mountain goats and bighorn sheep. However, “wildlife are wild” and as such, sightings are never guaranteed.</p>
FIRST PASSAGE TO THE WEST HIGHLIGHTS	<p>Fraser Canyon - Marvel at the Fraser Canyon as you exit the Coast Mountains. This deep canyon is a natural wonder that extends all the way to the town of Hope, with steep sides soaring up to 600 metres (1980 feet) above the water.</p> <p>The Last Spike – You will pass the stone cairn of Craigellachie where the last railroad spike was driven, linking Canada’s railway from coast to coast. The landmark is named after a large rock in Banffshire County, Scotland where Donald Smith, who drove in the last spike, had grown up. The rock was meant as a symbol of determination.</p> <p>Spiral Tunnels – A unique architectural wonder built over 20 months starting in 1907, the Upper and Lower Spiral Tunnels were constructed through Mount Ogden and Cathedral Mountain, to improve safety by reducing the grade. It is fascinating to watch lengthy freight trains as they snake their way through these tunnels.</p> <p>Stoney Creek Bridge – One of the most important bridges of its time, the beautiful Stoney Creek Bridge spans 147.6 metres (484 feet) and towers 99 metres (325 feet) above the creek bed.</p> <p>Hell’s Gate - The thundering waters of the renowned tourist attraction, Hell’s Gate, are a fascinating sight. Located at the most narrow and intimidating point in the Fraser River, as much as 909,218,000 litres (200 million gallons) of water surge through the 33.53 metre (110 foot) gorge each minute.</p> <p>Rogers Pass – Tunnels, such as the remarkable Mount MacDonald Tunnel, snow sheds and glistening glaciers characterize this pass through the Selkirk Mountains. The pass is named after the man who discovered it, Major A.B. Rogers, a surveyor and locating engineer working for the Canadian Pacific Railway.</p>
JOURNEY THROUGH THE CLOUDS HIGHLIGHTS	<p>Fraser River – The mighty Fraser River is the longest river in British Columbia and the 5th longest in all of Canada. The rushing waters carve through rock layers and carry sediment from the western slopes of the Rocky Mountains all the way to the Georgia Strait and the Pacific Ocean. Heavy with sediment, the waters are a muddy brown to milky green. Named after Simon Fraser, who originally mistook the river to be the</p>

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	<p>Columbia River, the Fraser produces more salmon than any other river system in the world. It is estimated that 10 million salmon travel up the Fraser River to spawn each year and First Nations people continue to use traditional fishing methods along its shores.</p> <p>Fraser Canyon – Marvel at the Fraser Canyon as you exit the Coast Mountains. This deep canyon is a natural wonder that extends all the way to Hope, with steep sides soaring up to 600 metres (1980 feet) above the water.</p> <p>Hell’s Gate - The thundering waters of the renowned tourist attraction, Hell’s Gate, are a fascinating sight. Located at the most narrow and intimidating point in the Fraser River, as much as 909,218,000 litres (200 million) gallons of water surge through the 33.53 metre (110 foot) gorge each minute.</p> <p>Mount Robson – Soaring a majestic 3,956.5 metres (12,972 feet), this heavily glaciated peak is the highest of the Canadian Rockies. Dropping into Berg Lake to the North and Kinney Lake to the South, this mountain is a towering giant compared to the snow tipped peaks that surround it. Originally, this great mountain was named Yuh-hai-has-kun, meaning “The Mountain of the Spiral Road” by the aboriginal people in the area.</p> <p>Pyramid Falls - As you pass the magnificent Pyramid Falls, cascading 91.5 metres (300 feet) beside the train tracks, the train will slow down to allow you a close-up view of this spectacular site. When the wind is right, you might enjoy a misty spray from the falls.</p> <p>Albreda Glacier – This is a great vantage point to observe the Albreda Glacier. Glaciers are permanent snowfields formed in locations where snowfall exceeds snowmelt each year. The weight of the accumulated snow compresses the under layers into ice, which then melts, allowing the glacier to move downhill. The movement grinds rocks into a fine powder, which is deposited in the lakes and rivers below giving the water a beautiful turquoise blue color.</p> <p>Jasper National Park - Traveling through Jasper National Park will allow you to explore one of the largest protected areas in the world, designated a Canadian Rocky Mountains Park World Heritage Site by UNESCO</p>
<p>OVERNIGHT ACCOMMODATION</p>	<p>These daylight rail tours through the Canadian Rockies are scheduled to show you all of the spectacular scenery. After a day onboard the train,</p>

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	<p>you overnight in either Kamloops or Quesnel, British Columbia. You do not sleep on the train.</p>
KAMLOOPS	<p>Located in the heart of British Columbia’s interior, surrounded by the fascinating, hillside landscape of Canada’s only semi-arid desert, Kamloops is one of the hubs of the province.
